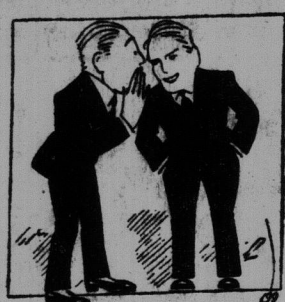

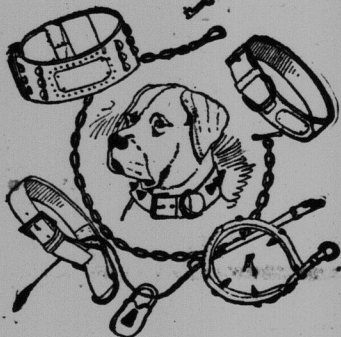

About fifty men were at work on the Douglas Avenue paving job this morning. The "key stone" excavation, which has been purchased by the contractors, is now in the city and will be started in operation tomorrow.

Several young people including the Golden Chain Club and the Baroque Class of Victoria street church met at the home of Miss Estelle MacLean, 184 Millidge Avenue on last Friday evening and tendered her a surprise party. The evening was pleasantly spent in music and games, after which dainty refreshments were served. On behalf of those present George Whittaker presented to her a beautiful camera and a half dozen films. Miss MacLean although taken very much by surprise, thanked her many friends for their kindness. The party broke up about midnight.

### FIVE DELEGATES GOING

Four St. John delegates to the National Council of Women will leave for Calgary on Thursday evening by C. N. R. They are the vice-president, Mrs. W. Edmond Raymond; Mrs. W. F. Roberts; Mrs. William McAvity; and Miss Fingery. Mrs. Raymond, who is also a delegate, is now in Montreal, en route west. The party leaving on Thursday will spend Saturday in Toronto, and attend a meeting of the Council of Women there, and will leave for the official trail on Saturday night. They will arrive in Calgary on Wednesday of next week, at noon. A notable programme of official entertainment has been arranged for them in that city.

### THE LATE MISS MELVIN

The friends of Miss Alice Melvin in St. John and elsewhere learned with regret of her death almost at the outset of her life work at Lawrence, Kansas. Miss Melvin was a graduate of the High School of this city, a B. A. class honors, and an M. A. of the University of Pennsylvania. After graduating at McGill she taught one year at St. John's School, Belleville, Ontario, and the next at the Quincey Mansion School, at Quincey, Mass. She thus took her post graduate course at Pennsylvania, where she won a scholarship. After passing a further year at Pennsylvania toward the degree of Doctor of Philosophy, she accepted a position as teacher of English at the University of Kansas. Attacked with appendicitis on Saturday, 21st of May, she succumbed early Tuesday, the 24th, after an operation. Thus early and sadly closed a career which gave every promise of brilliancy in academic life. Miss Melvin was the eldest daughter of Dr. George G. Melvin, chief medical officer of this province. Her mother, who was Miss Alice Marven, daughter of the late Josiah Marven, of Shelburne, N. B., died just three years ago. She leaves, besides her father, one sister, Miss Georgie Melvin, who will spend the summer in Fredericton with her father. Miss Melvin's body was brought from Kansas by her father and sister to this city yesterday, for burial at Fern Hill, beside her mother.

### POLICE COURT

Daniel J. Britt, charged with having liquor unlawfully in his beer shop, Haymarket Square, was before the police court this morning. Evidence was given by Sub-Inspector McLean, who told of seeing a glass in the sink behind the counter which, he said, looked and smelled and it had contained liquor. W. J. Ryan appeared for the prosecution. The case was postponed until Wednesday morning and the accused left a deposit of \$200.

Morris Lambert, Joseph Skolsky and Maurice Kuslitsky, proprietors of second hand stores in Main street, were all charged with keeping their places of business open after hours. No evidence was taken and the case was postponed until tomorrow morning.

## FINE TRIBUTE TO PREMIER FOSTER

London Times Correspondent in House of Commons Says Some Nice Things—Premier Expresses Regret at the Death of Hon. Frank Sweeney and John Vanderbeck, M. P. P.

In a letter to his secretary, E. S. Carter, written in London, Premier Foster has expressed keen regret in the death of Hon. Frank Sweeney and John Vanderbeck, M. P. P. for Northumberland, when he held one of the best known men in their parts of the province. He said that Hon. Mr. Sweeney was one of the outstanding figures in the political and social circles in which he moved. The Premier said that he attended the House of Commons but on account of the Irish trouble the gallery was closed. The Premier, however, was given a seat in the distinguished strangers' gallery.

He also spoke of attending a dinner given in honor of Colonel Harvey, the new American ambassador, at which the Duke of Connaught presided and Lloyd George spoke.

The Premier visited Scotland and expressed his pleasure with the trip. He spoke of the difficulties of moving about by train on account of the coal strike, but motor cars were taking the place of trains in many places, particularly in the vicinity of London.

The coal strike, in the Premier's opinion, was more serious than the newspaper would indicate, although they referred to it as particularly critical.

Banquet for the Premier.

The London Times, of recent date, says a few nice things about Premier Foster. One paragraph, clipped from the House of Commons correspondence says:—

"Walter Foster, the prime minister of New Brunswick is only the first of a large number of dominion and provincial prime ministers who are coming to this country from overseas. Next month London will be full of dominion representatives and of course all the leading statesmen are coming over for the imperial conference. Mr. Foster who is staying at the Savoy is just here on a holiday. He is a remarkable man, of fine build and handsome appearance, facile and alert, with a similarity in features to President Wilson. He always wears a most perfect suit and is one of the best grounded men we have seen at the house of commons for some time."

Speaks on Cattle Embargo.

The London Daily Express, house correspondence, contains the following:—"An interested visitor at the House of Commons yesterday was Mr. Walter Foster, Premier of New Brunswick who is in England on a short holiday. He was the guest of Lt. Col. McLean, M. P. son of a distinguished member of the dominion parliament. Mr. Foster has the record experience of being made premier before taking his seat in parliament. "New Brunswick," he said in an interview "is proud of the men it has given to the empire, and especially of Mr. Bonar Law and Lord Beaverbrook, whose work we have followed with eager interest. Mr. Bonar Law's illness caused wide spread regret but we hope that he will now be able to visit his native country. Lord Beaverbrook's activities are closely followed in New Brunswick and we admire the great talent he has brought to the service of the nation and the empire. The phenomenal success and great activity have not prevented him from keeping in touch with the province which he visits every year and to which he has given so much generous assistance."

"Canada is greatly moved about the cattle embargo question," he said, "and will follow up the work of the commission which the government has decided to set up. The idea that there is disease in Canada is ridiculous and no question has been discussed on which a stronger feeling exists."

It is reported that the labor situation in the city and vicinity has taken a decided change for the better this week, and the indications are that the army of unemployed here will be greatly reduced all summer. This morning an application for 100 men for pulp work was received at the mayor's office. The Penobscot Development Co., made the application, the men to be employed at Pokok Station on the Valley Railway. The prospects are that the job will be good for nine or ten months and the pay is \$2 a day and board. Transportation is paid if the men go to work. The men will be employed in peeling pulp wood and other kindred occupations. A representative of the company was in the city today and will leave on this afternoon's train, taking with him the first lot of men supplied through the mayor's employment office.

About fifty men were at work on Douglas Avenue paving work this morning and the Stephen Construction Co., the contractors on the job, are now considering working day and night shifts there, so as to hasten the work and at the same time make available employment for the many men who have applied to them.

It is expected that the work of paving Brussels street, which was authorized at yesterday's common council meeting will be commenced within the next fortnight and between fifty and 100 men will find employment there. With the water main renewals that are being carried out or planned by the water department, the projected movement of the Marsh road to the One Mile House, the laying of the new Spruce Lake main and the hydro development at Musquash, it is regarded as quite certain that the majority of the unemployed of this section of the country will be taken care of until the fall at least.

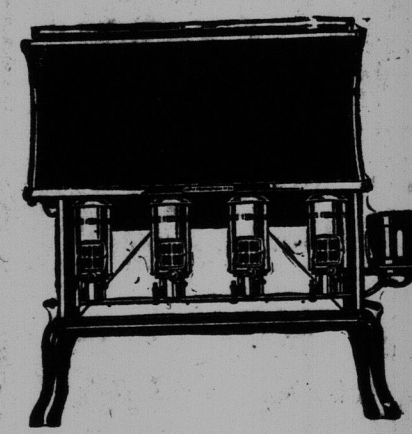

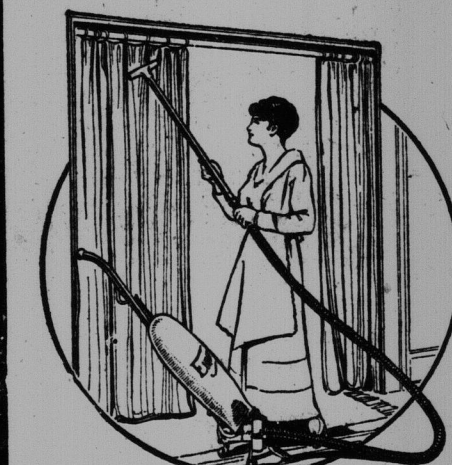
