EDUCATIONAL FILM INDUSTRY HIGHLY DEVELOPED IN CANADA

Importance of Visual Presentation Being Increasingly Recognized by Educationists Specializes in Presentation of Dominion's Natural Resources

(Toronto Globe.) Among the new industries which are being developed in Canada and which have promise of substantial expansion, not the least important is the production of educational motion picture films. While still in its pioneer stage, this business has a promising future, and it may be a prelude to the establishment of the made-in-Canada amusement film. Manufacture of motion pictures is a precarious business even in the United States, where there are many thousands of theatres. In Canada, where the number of photo-play houses is much more limited, the making of amusement films is not a ready profit-maker, and no attempt to produce them has been a commercial success. The motion picture industry in this country considers that it is quite possible to institute a successful venture of this kind in the production of educational films. The efforts were directed towards the building up of an export trade. This has not yet been attempted, however. In the making of educational films, Canada has made rapid strides of progress, and may be said without exaggeration to lead the world in this branch of industry.

Has Had Phenomenal Growth. During the last decade there have been extraordinary developments in the motion picture business in the United States, France and England particularly. The American branch of the industry has assumed a stupendous magnitude and is now rated with the first six industries of the country. Many millions of dollars have been invested and many thousands of highly-paid employees are connected with it. The rapid growth of the business and the easily accessible nature of the industry have introduced many abuses. Competition grew keener and producers vied with each other in paying extraordinary sums for players, directors and scenarios.

There has been a "weeding-out" process in the last two or three years, and under the stress of war-time economies many changes have been wrought in the personnel and methods of the industry. A transformation has been effected from haphazard methods to more systematic ones that have been adopted in older established lines of business. The production of motion pictures is now getting on a permanent basis, with smaller profits but with greater stability.

Rev. George Scott, agent of the Children's Aid Society, received a pleasant surprise last night at his home. He had never been ordained, although he had held a pastorate in Princeton. Housewives were busy with their preparations for the feast attending the ordination and everything was ready. The council was called. Then the ordination plans stopped. It was given out that there was a difference in the beliefs held by Rev. Mr. Hall and those who were to be his people.

The sudden stopping of the ordination plans caused more talk. It was during this period that Rev. Mr. Hall preached one of his most forceful sermons on The Rainbow and the Cloud, beseeching his people to look on the bright side and see the best in the relations between man and man.

Rev. Mr. Hall was again seen walking with Miss Groux and in reply to criticisms stated that he was trying to win her soul.
