During the year just closed the W. W.

Turnbull fund was increased by \$600, of which \$500 was a bequest from the late treasurer, Mr. J. V. Ellis, while the other hundred was made up by four life members, Mrs. A. R. Campbell, Dr. T. The expenditure of the year totalled \$7,984.55, which is \$672.58 less than in 1918, but last year some \$1,500 was spent in plumbing, while the extraordinary expensive outlays being for a furnace costing some \$475, and the kitchen range, \$150. It therefore seems wise to direct attention to the increase in ordinary expenses which in the last two years have largely exceeded the income. Another feature of the year's operations that is worthy of note is the reduction in revenue for paying patients. On this account the receipts of the year just closed were some \$800 less than in last year, a decrease sufficiently large to excite interest as to the cause. With increased expenditure and a declining revenue the home does not start the year with quite as good a balance on hand as last year.
