

Insurance Plan To Pay School Costs

SHREWSBURY, Jan. 16-A new SHREWSBURY, Jan. 16—A new scheme of educational insurance was discussed at the Headmasters' convention here. The object is to provide for the education of a boy whose responsible parent might die whilst he is at school. A well-known insurance company has offered to handle the scheme, guaranteeing a school payment of \$200 per term for the payment of a premium of \$5 per term. This premium would be paid direct to the school authorities in the same way as all other charges, and on the death of the parent payment of school fees would be continued, thus assuring continuation of the child's education.
