Big Tourist Traffic Maritime Provinces

According to a dispatch from Ot-
 tawa last week to the Toronto Fi-
 nancial Post, the Canadian National
 Railways and the people of the Mar-
 itime Provinces have had 70,000 tour-
 ists visiting there during the past
 season and it is estimated they left
 \$3,000,000 an amount equal to the
 provincial revenue. "The provinces
 are keen on getting their share of
 the tourist traffic. They see the
 State of Maine getting no less than
 \$30,000,000 a year from this business,"
 says the Ottawa report, "and they
 contend that nature and art have giv-
 en them as good as Maine and they
 believe that with more intense ad-
 vertising they will do much better
 next summer." What can be said
 of the Maritime Provinces can also
 be said of Newfoundland and when
 we are fully awake to our opportu-
 nities we shall be as keen as Cana-
 dians and Americans in catering to
 the tourist traffic.

Public Wharves Rebuilt

Three public wharves in this sec-
 tion have been re-built this fall.
 The wharf at Coley's Point has
 been repaired under the supervision
 of Messrs. James Dawe and George
 Barrett. No doubt the public of that
 place who have need to use that
 landing-place are expressing their ap-
 proval of the work which has been
 so well done.

The wharf at Bay Roberts west has
 been supervised by Mr. Joseph Rus-
 sell and is now fit for vessels to land
 their cargoes.

Much favourable comment has been
 passed on the splendid workmanship
 in the construction of the wharf op-
 posite the Cross Road. Under the
 supervision of Mr. Jas. G. Baggs, the
 wharf has been built so as to partly
 cover a rock on the west side, which
 was a danger to vessels lying at the
 wharf. The head of the wharf has
 been widened, which makes it an
 advantage in landing the cargo of
 large size vessels.

Those in charge of the construc-
 tion of these three wharves have the
 entire approval and appreciation of
 the public for work well and econ-
 omically done.
