THE NORTH END AROUSED.

THE GOVERNMENT CANDIDATES.

Stirring addresses made by the City and County Candidates, Aid, Repeal and other Active Engaged in.

The friends of the government resident in the North end must have been despondent during the last meeting held in Berryman's Hall, East end, on Monday.

An early hour Union hall was so completely filled that it was almost impossible to get admission to the room. Perfect unanimity prevailed. Cheers after cheer were raised as the assemblage perceived the various candidates enter.

At eight o'clock Hon. James Holly was on motion, Aid, Kelly, elected chairman. After thanking the meeting for their election of minutes the chairman remarked it would afford anyone a pleasure seldom experienced to preside at such a grand meeting. He then introduced

HON. R. McLELLAN, who received an ovation as he advanced to the front of the platform; he said:

They had all read the statements of the different candidates and were surfeited with politics and no doubt had come to the conclusion that there was not much truth in either party. On Monday next, nomination day, he would reply to all the charges which had been made against him and the various candidates of the government.

The government had been charged with being corrupt, working against the interests of the North end, while charges had been made against himself also. Without going too far into details he thought that friends of these charges were true.

His esteemed friend, Mr. Joseph W. Lawrence, had thought to attack him through the columns of the Sun, but he did not wish to reply in the same spirit. He might say that he had no doubt that Mr. Lawrence was still a supporter of the government if he had been a legislative councillor. (A voice, so he would) (Hear, hear, Applause.)

He had been an applicant for the position one could deny. He had been a supporter of the government until the last hour of the year of 1889, but had not thought fit to oppose them. Mr. Lawrence said the speaker goes on to cite in his letter what the Globe said some days ago. He would ask the audience what he had to do with what appeared in the Globe. He would offer to resign his seat if they would refer to any newspaper of the house, or an newspaper, where he had said he would resign his seat if Mr. Peters was appointed judge as stated in Mr. Lawrence's letter.

No more noble or more generous minded man served the province than Dr. Elder (Hear, hear.) He was a man who was fair to all.

He cherished more than that of many who had passed away. With Dr. Elder he had signed his name to a telegram asking the government not to appoint Mr. Peters until a hearing was held. But he did not resign their seats because they were appointed judge. Long after Mr. Peters was appointed—weeks after—and after they had given votes for the government on the question of granting subsidies to the railway case. He had opposed a majority of the government.

If you return the opposition, should they vote for the government, in late years when noting the great progress of the province and a Scotchman had voted against the abolition of the council. It had been charged that he had voted against the subsidy for harbor improvements. He voted against it because he felt that \$2,500 was too little for St. John when \$1,000,000 were to be spent over the province and he felt the voice could not afford it. But when the question of the dry dock came up separately his friends knew where he was. The \$2,500 had been already paid and he, with his colleagues, were pledged to secure more. The very persons who were now crying out against what they call "putting out of Mr. Peters were the ones who opposed his appointment. With reference to Mr. J. B. Jones' application for the registration of births, marriages and deaths, he said he did not get the appointment because he did not secure the approbation of their supporters. He would not seek to repudiate the letter he had written concerning that matter. His view was that unless the consent of his colleagues were obtained to that appointment Mr. Jones could not be appointed. No more than could his brother-in-law, who also was an applicant for that position. Mr. Knight received the support of the members of the city and county and he consequently received the appointment.

He did not wish to deal with the question of the police magistracy until something definite in regard to it could be alleged by his opponents, for so far their opposition merely was that he had not been appointed. He did not wish to say anything derogatory to the honesty or dignity of any public official, nor indulge in any personal attacks. Mr. Peters had been legislated out of office, as had Squire Tapley, Mr. Godard and others. (Applause.) Mr. Peters had inserted in the bill, very carefully, a clause to the effect that he should be continued in office until his successor was appointed. As was well known in the community Messrs. Stockton and Alward were willing that Mr. Ritchie should be appointed after the opening of the next session. They (the government) thought they were the best judges of that themselves. He felt that on election day the people would say to Messrs. Stockton and Alward: "Gentlemen, you may stay at home. You have resigned. You can't do that and get back just when you want to. (Applause.) After he (the speaker) had made himself prominent by voting against what Mr. Lawrence called the dock act, he had come back to the people and Mr. Lawrence had supported him. He would stow on nomination day that St. John received a fair share of the public money of the province. He could also show that during the last 11 years John had received for roads and bridges double as much as in the previous 11 years. He could show many other things, but thought it best to wait until nomination day. So far as he could learn the opposition charged them with being a corrupt and extravagant government, with displacing an honorable and upright man, and with not being fair to St. John. When the bill was passed, he could show that they had been fair to St. John, that they had administered affairs well and could justify the appointment of Mr. Ritchie. (Applause.)

The election had been brought on by the government because of the passing of the new franchise act, and he felt it was proper that the electors should be given the right to decide who would administer the affairs of the province. had noticed that one of the opposition speakers accounting for the small attendance at his own meeting Monday evening had said that perhaps a few had gone to the funeral at the expense of the government. (Applause.) The opposition thinking that it was not representative of the North End of the city, having only one man on the ticket, he had not thought fit to do anything about it. He did not care to say anything about the funeral of the late Mr. Lawrence, but he never proscribed any man for his religion, nor were they afraid to put any man on the ticket because of his religious views. (Applause.) There was no trouble of the kind in the city and county standing what appeared in a certain St. John newspaper. They came for the people upon the record of the Blair government. He would not introduce any party division politics. He treated that all as one man and he would not divide the whole ticket. If this were done every man on the government ticket would be elected. (Applause.)

MR. PETERS expressed the pleasure and honor which he felt in attending the meeting of the city of St. John, and particularly so because, if elected, he would have represented the North end of the city of St. John.
