## MANY HOMESEEKERS AMONG THE DEAD

TWO SCORE PASSENGERS KILLED IN COLLISION

Report that Operator Was Asleep at His Post and Failed to Hold Train.

Pueblo, Colo., March 16.-Some two score lives were crushed out early today in a head-on collision of two pasfire that destroyed the wrecked coach-Many others were injured, but all probably will recover.

Many of the dead were homeseekers, the flames being so hot, the rescuers they should do their share towards the fuel had burned out.

Cause of Collision.

Denver, March 16.-It is reported here that an operator's failure to deliver a train order was the cause of the collision. The first orders given the two trains were that they should meet at Adobe. Later, it is understood, the dispatcher wired Operator S. F. Lively, at Swallows, ten miles east of the scene of the wreck, to hold the westbound train there until the eastbound train number 16 should pass. When was notified to run on to Swallows. westward. Operator Lively was asleep, at Pueblo if it had passed, he answer-"No." A warrant is out for his ar-

Hardly had the noise of the wreck ceased when a sheet of fire ran through the shattered cars. In the forward coach of the westbound train every seat was occupied by passengers, most of whom were homeseekers. Many foreigners were among them and in their terror they succumbed without attempting to reach safety, being roasted alive. The cooler ones seeing their danger rushed for the windows and doors, and with the aid of the passengers in the rear of the train and those members of the train crew who were unhurt, reached the open air. Many were injured by the rough handling they received or by flying glass.

It is impossible to determine the exact number of deaths on account of the incineration of many bodies. The monetary damage is \$600,000. Much baggage and mail were destroy-
