Rev. R. A. Armstrong Entertained at Luncheon by Brotherhood of St. Andrew at Scammell's Last Night.

Rev. R. A. Armstrong, the new rector of Trinity Church, was cordially welcomed to St. John last evening at a luncheon given in his honor at Scammell's restaurant. Allan H. Wetmore, president of the Local Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, who were the hosts, presided. Those present numbered forty, and included Rev. Dr. Raymond, Rev. Mr. McKiel, Rev. E. B. Hooper, Rev. J. E. Hand, Rev. Mr. Scovell, Rev. W. B. Stewart and Rev. Mr. Trueman of the Society.

After the dainty repast prepared by Mr. Scammell had been partaken of, Rev. Mr. Raymond presented the greetings of the brotherhood to Rev. Mr. Armstrong, and also extended to him a hearty welcome to the city. Mr. Wetmore read letters of regret at their inability to be present from Rev. Mr. Kahuna, Rev. Mr. Sampson, Conductor Bishop Richardson and H. C. Tilley.

Rev. Dr. Raymond welcomed the new rector on behalf of the clergy of the denomination in a brief but felicitous speech. Rev. Mr. Trueman, a classmate of Rev. Mr. Armstrong when they were students at Toronto University, expressed his gratitude for the warmth of the reception extended to him, and expressed his particular pleasure at having the co-operation and sympathy of the men of St. John. He also spoke of the great value to the church of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

Rev. Mr. Hooper, Rev. Mr. Scovell and Rev. Mr. Stewart also spoke briefly, in a welcoming manner, of Rev. Mr. Armstrong as the most cordial manner to the scene of his new labors.

Hawke, who has been president for two years, would be re-elected as secretary, and he had at the request of a large number of members agreed, though desiring personally to resign, to accept the nomination.

James P. Ryan, a leading Liberal, however, nominated Fulton McDougall, local manager of the Royal Bank, and he had a very strong support. The lower floor was occupied by a house baker, and Geo. Mulloney, boots and shoes. Practically nothing was saved from either floor. Mulloney was moving into his store.
