The man who hesitates before it are the man who drop out and become merged in the great inert mass which must be moved before the work is done. Those who meet it with a whole-souled 'yes' are the men who accomplish results.

It took years for Jacob A. Riis to convince New York that it was worth while to heal the open sore of Mulberry Bend. It took months to gather the evidence which led to the defeat of Tammany Hall, and other months to weld together the many and diverse political organizations through which that defeat was accomplished. In other cities the same kind of patient, unquestioning effort is raising the standard of municipal politics and the level of public service.

In all these works it's dogged as does it. Knowledge, culture, education are good tools, but the real force is the faith of the man who knows that it is worth while, who has the courage to begin a great work and who keeps undauntedly at it.
