ANOTHER WISE MAN BUYS FARM IN N. B.

R. S. Horne will Dispose of Holdings in Canadian West and Take Sunbury County Farm.

Another wise man from the West has decided to locate in New Brunswick. R. S. Horne, an Englishman, who went to the West ten years ago and has experience in farming in Alberta and fruit raising in British Columbia, has taken advantage of the Farm Settlement Act to secure a farm of 175 acres at Lincoln, Sunbury county.

As a result of the publicity campaign of the Provincial Government, Mr. Horne heard of the chances here in New Brunswick and came here some weeks ago to investigate the situation for himself. He was so pleased with conditions here that he decided to sell out his holdings in the West and through the assistance of A. B. Wilmot, immigration officer at Fredericton, was able to enter into an agreement with the Farm Settlement Board whereby he will take over a large farm at Lincoln, and put up some large buildings on it.

Mr. Horne who has brought his family with him has had many years experience with farming, and will no doubt make a success in his new home. He will make a specialty of fruit raising and growing potatoes. Mr. Horne told Mr. Wilmot that when they get a reliable information about New Brunswick as he did, people will be coming here in increasing numbers.

FIRST LECTURE OF THE SEASON

Large Audience Heard Excellent Discourse by Mrs. Adam Shortt, at Women's Canadian Club—New Members.

In Keith's suite yesterday afternoon the Women's Canadian Club held the first lecture of the season, when Mrs. Adam Shortt, of Ottawa, addressed the members of the club on "The Responsibility of Women to Women."

The opening of the season was auspicious in every respect. The lecture was particularly large, an evidence of the popularity of the lecture course and of the realization on the part of the ladies of the club of the high ideals of patriotism and loyalty which the club has as its objective. During the business meeting which preceded the lecture, several new members were admitted.

The minutes of the annual meeting were submitted and adopted and a number of routine matters dealt with. The president, Mrs. E. A. Smith, in a brief address congratulated the club on the interest manifested in the work last year, and the encouraging prospects evidenced by the large attendance at the meeting. She then introduced the lecturer of the day as one of the pioneers among women graduates in medicine, and also president of the Women's Canadian Club of Ottawa.

Mrs. Shortt, in her interesting lecture, first showed her hearers the evolution which has taken place in the matter of education among women. For centuries the privilege of higher education was denied her as incompatible; at a not very remote period even England ridiculed the idea of advanced education for woman.

In proportion, however, as the mind of man broadened through education, the prejudice against admitting women to the same educational privileges grew less marked, the barriers raised against her were removed and in the university the doors of academic education were opened to women, and they were admitted to the enjoyment of the what had hitherto been held as man's prerogative.
