MAY CHANGE THE DIOCESAN LIMITS OF ENGLISH CHURCH

It is thought in Church of England circles that a change in the location of the eastern diocese will be effected in the near future. This feeling is caused by the fact that the provincial synod has not met for some years, the general synod having to a large extent taken its place but now the general synod has consented to the division of the provincial synod which is now composed of dioceses of Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces. As this is the case it is now necessary that meeting of the provincial synod be held to make arrangements for the division which will probably be in the following: All the dioceses of Ontario will form a provincial synod to be presided over by Archbishop Charles Hamilton of Ottawa. Bishop Farthing will be in charge of the diocese of Montreal, Bishop Dunn of Quebec and Bishop Richardson of Fredericton, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island will be under the charge of Bishop Worsell. This will make practically five dioceses with only four bishops.

GREATEST DEMONSTRATION EVER ACCORDED TO PUBLIC MAN IN MONTREAL'S HISTORY

Senator Daniel Gives His Impressions of Great Welcome Given to Right Hon. R. L. Borden, in Canada's Commercial Metropolis.

When asked last evening by a reporter of The Standard to say something about his impressions of the demonstration given to Right Hon. R. L. Borden in Montreal, Senator Daniel said: "That is a pretty large order. My chief impression was of the vastness of the crowds, the sustained enthusiasm of the people. I was told by a well known resident of Montreal, a man who is not given to exaggeration, and who is well qualified to judge, that the welcome given to Mr. Borden in Montreal was undoubtedly the greatest demonstration ever accorded a public man in the commercial metropolis of Canada. "At the landing place there was an immense concourse of people, and along the line of the procession from the pier to the Windsor Hotel, a distance of two miles, the streets were lined with dense masses of people. And all along the line of march the banners and streamers, and every where the enthusiasm of the people knew no bounds. English and French speaking Canadians vied with one another in doing honor to the Premier; one could not say which gave him the most cordial reception. Along the line of march, however, were stretched across the streets banners bearing greetings in French and English, but the dominant note of the occasion, the spirit of the intermingled crowds was obviously keyed to
