Annual Meeting Last Evening—The New Directors—Night School Planned—Address by Major May.

Reports presented at the annual meeting of the Y.M.C.A. last evening, show that the institute is in a flourishing condition. The membership roll reaches the splendid total of 934. The various features of the work at the institute were most successfully carried out during the year and indications point to the furtherance of the work during the coming year. A night school is one of the projects which it is intended to launch.  
John Keefe, the president, occupied the chair and there was a large attendance of members. The president in his report reviewed the work of the year and said that the results which had been accomplished should serve as an incentive to the members to in-

crease the usefulness of the institute during the coming year.

Treasurer Thomas Nagle's report showed a tidy balance to the credit of the institute.

F. Christie reported for the boys' committee that the classes under Professor Winston had made considerable

progress in their floor work and athletics.

William J. Magee reported for the membership committee that 934 members were now on the roll of the institute.

Dr. W. P. Broderick reported for the educational committee that an excellent reading room had been furnished, where the latest magazines and newspapers might be found. During the year lectures had been delivered by Dr. Cox, Dr. Townsend and Hugh F. Hamilton, and the committee desired to express its appreciation to these gentlemen for their kindness in assisting the institute in this connection.

The holding of night classes in school subjects had occupied the attention of the committee who desired that these classes be undertaken under the auspices of the institute. The last lecture of the series, Dr. Broderick announced would be given on Wednesday, May 23rd, by the Rev. Monsignor Barnes, the Catholic chaplain at Oxford University, who would address the citizens on Catholic Education. The committee expressed appreciation of the assistance rendered by Rev. Fr. Duke and the general secretary, J. H. Cohan.

E. A. Sterling, the secretary of the physical culture committee, reported on the success of the gymnasium work under Professor Winston as well as the success of the bowling league under George Magee. The report mentioned that over 2,000 members of the overseas battalions had had the use of the rooms, gymnasium and swimming pools during the past season.

J. L. Mullaney presented the report of the social committee.

On the meeting proceeding to ballot the following new directors were chosen: H. Dever, H. O. McInerney, Dr. L. Flemming, C. A. Owens and J. A. Barry.

Major May, representing the 62nd Regiment, was then introduced. Major May said that he was present through the permission of His Lordship the Bishop to lay before the meeting the plans for the organization of the 62nd Regiment for home defence. The daily papers would contain the date of the issue of uniforms and he asked that as soon as this announcement is made the members of the institute report themselves for home defence. Major May carried his hearers to the battlefields of France and Flanders and reviewed conditions there. He paid a high tribute to Private Keenan, who led the bombers in the famous crater fight in which twenty-nine members of the 26th Battalion participated. He also referred feelingly to the excellent work of the late Sergeant Frank

Cotter, characterizing these men and other Catholic soldiers as real heroes. He said that the present war was not a conflict between men of different religions but between men who stood for the cause of humanity on one side and inhumanity on the other. In his remarks the speaker mentioned the splendid work of Capt. Geo. Keefe.

Before the close of the meeting Rev. Wm. Duke thanked the directors for the interest they had shown in the success of the work of the institute during the year. He referred to the necessity of enlarging the work among the juniors and to the importance of inaugurating the night school classes.

Progress Continues
