MANCHESTER GUARDIAN IS NOT PLEASED

Indulges in Criticism of President Wilson's Reply To Austrian Peace Proposals.

By Arthur S. Draper. (Special Cable to The Tribune and The St. John Standard) London, Sept. 21.—The editorial comment of "The Manchester Guardian," which heretofore has invariably supported every utterance of President Wilson, is in sharp contrast with his reply to Austria.

"There will be rejoicing in high official quarters at Potsdam today," says "The Guardian," which adds, "Germany obtained precisely the flat refusal which she desired."

"Without asking any question of departure," "The Guardian" says: "The proper course for any government desirous of peace was to reply in this sense, reading Austria of the terms proposed on our side and inviting an answer on the question whether she would be willing to discuss peace on those terms."

EMPTY PLATITUDES FROM THE KAISER

Wilhelm Uses Opening of Dorpat University As Excuse For Another Wordy Message.

Amsterdam, Sept. 21.—On the occasion of the opening of Dorpat University, Emperor Wilhelm, according to the Dusseldorf Nachrichten sent the following message to the rector and professors:

"Among the changing events and impressions of the war which the German fatherland has been forced to wage in defense of its sacred soil and its Kultur against a world of enemies, the liberation of our German brothers has given me very special joy. My joy is increased by the fact that the venerable alma mater of Dorpat has so soon been awakened to the activity as the center of intellectual life and that a valuable source of strength for prosperity is regained by the old German Kultur land."

HUN PILLAGE IN CAMBRAI

"We Lived Like Fighting Cocks" Says Soldier.

With the British Army in France, Sept. 21.—(By the Associated Press)—The pillaging of Cambrai after its capture by the British is thus described in a letter written by a soldier on September 10:

"In Cambrai we lived like fighting cocks. All the civilians had to go out of the town, leaving behind many valuable articles, with which we Germans greatly amused ourselves. The food office was regularly stormed. Here one officer and fifteen of the guard fell, a sorrowful but true state of affairs. Our section, of course, took an active part. We bought a heap of things for very little money. I had the good luck to obtain access to a wine cellar, which was flooded with wine. We also took a stock of bottles of brandy—and all this in the fourth year of the war!"

"We have just put a juicy roast of horse flesh over the fire. We got it yesterday from a horse which had just been killed. The beast had hardly fallen when men came running from all sides with hatchets and knives. We managed to get a fine cut from the leg."
