The V. W. grand secretary, he said, reported all records broken in this jurisdiction. The same reports came from other grand lodges throughout Canada, the increase in membership has been phenomenal.

Recommendations. "I would strongly endorse the recommendation as set forth by the grand master in his annual address to the brethren at a previous session of grand lodge, that the office of the grand secretary should be located in the Masonic Temple.

Suitable rooms could be easily set aside in building not only as an office where the grand secretary and assistant could be available during business hours, but also as a depot for Masonic supplies.

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"I would recommend that both these suggestions be carefully looked into by the board of general purposes."

Grand Secretary. In his report J. Twining Hart, the grand secretary included the following items: Receipts from private lodges \$5,150.90.

Total membership on Dec. 27, 1920, 4,967 members, an increase of 537 for the year.

The hall committee, G. D. Ellis, chairman, reported expending \$2,300 in various repairs to the building. In addition to their report, several Masonic bodies paid in \$1,228. An increase of \$1,000 in rental receipts is anticipated this year, making the total from this source \$7,340. Expenditures are estimated at \$8,600.

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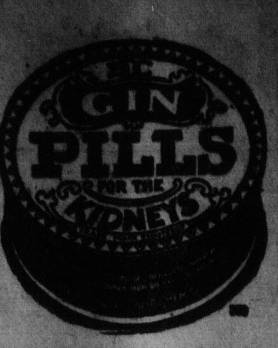
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May Use Oven To Cook Entire Meal

If baked food is planned as part of the dinner, the oven may do double or triple duty and save the whole meal, according to the food specialists at the New York State College of Agriculture.

Most oven-cooked foods have a richer flavor than the same foods prepared in other ways, and it is thought that they are also more digestible.

An oven to go over one burner at a gas or oil stove is large enough for a family of three or four persons, and its frequent use cuts down the fuel bill.

Here Are Five Meals. Menus for oven dinners are here suggested, and may be varied according to individual taste:

Salmon loaf, scalloped potatoes, and brown Betty. Casserole of rice and beef, baked squash, and coconut custard.

The custard is put in with the casserole and the squash, and taken out to cool while the rest of dinner is cooking.

Hamburg loaf, corn pudding, peach dumpling. Macaroni or spaghetti, with cheese and tomato, biscuit, and apple tapioca.

Chops, baked potatoes, cottage pie. A salad, soup or sauce may be served with any of these dinners, adding to the food value and making a more elaborate meal.

Oldest Poilu In France Dead

Chas. Suruge, Aged Eighty-Two Served Throughout the World War and Won Medals

Paris, April 26.—Charles Suruge, the oldest poilu of France, veteran of both the Franco-Prussian and the World War, died here today, aged 82 years.

He served as a volunteer throughout the War of 1870-71, volunteered again in 1915, at the age of 77, and was assigned to duty as a sapper. He joined the army at Bouchem and was in constant service thereafter.

He was cited in orders three times, was made a second lieutenant after the Verdun campaign, awarded the Legion of Honor in 1917, and made an officer of the Legion in 1919.
