This year has not witnessed any startling improvement in that regard. All licenses are supposed to be renewed by May I, but up to date only fifty of the documents have been issued. This leaves about the regulations and the names of these will be handed to the board at their next

meeting.

He recalled that the board had altered the by-laws because the dealers had represented that doing so would make it easier for them.
