## NOTES AND NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

John Weber was great three months  
in the Cincinnati workshop for stealing a  
vest worth about \$4. Poor in-vestment  
for John.

A man and his wife both eloped from  
Kearney City, Nebraska, on the same  
night a short time ago, each leaving a  
note for the other saying they had gone  
for good. "Two souls with but a single  
thought," etc.

Mosby began his campaign for Con-  
gress by getting into a brawl with a political  
antagonist by the name of Bush.  
The merits of war, says the Washington  
Capital, has become the bushwhacker  
of the present.

It is represented to be very dull in  
Washington diplomatic circles. There  
are no more dinners or receptions, and  
the leading members of the corps have taken  
their departure for the summer. Work  
upon the British legation building pro-  
gresses slowly, and, in all probability, it  
will be finished before the close of the  
year.

A St. Louis reporter, whose duties upon  
the street at night have frequently led  
him into the teeth of numerous ill-suspected  
dogs, visited the pound in that city the  
other day to goot over some of his im-  
pounded enemies. He writes: "It was  
singular to notice the immediate spring-  
ing into action of a majority of those  
dogs as we looked down among them,  
and it was equally singular as regards the  
perfect apathy of others."

The Jewish Times devotes a telling  
reference to showing that Gov. Moses, of  
South Carolina, is a Jew. All that is  
Jewish about the Governor is, that his  
father is a Jew—a man of unexceptionable  
reputation. The mother of the Gov-  
ernor is a Christian lady, and the son  
has not been brought up in the Jewish  
faith, has never associated with Jews,  
and his misfortune, no doubt—does not  
claim to be a Jew, and would not be re-  
cognized as such by the Jews were he to  
lay claim to it.

The aims of the Brooklyn Ladies' Anti-  
Tight Lacing Society are broader than  
the name of the organization would seem  
to indicate. The ladies will go from  
head to foot in dress reform. High-heeled  
boots are to be banished for simple  
reasons that they create bunions on the  
feet. In the matter of dress reform, it is  
recommended in place of pompadour  
and fish in the place of meat. The by-laws  
of the Society provide that no person  
shall be eligible to membership in the  
society who wears corsets or who does not  
wear her clothes suspended from her shoulders,  
and who does not live hygienically.

Geological processes have always been  
slow, and we do not see why "a noted  
geologist" should be in a hurry. A  
scientist of this sort in the employ of the  
Government, Mr. Edward R. Howland, ar-  
riving one day last week at Rochester on  
his way to join an exploring expedition  
to the various kinds of the geological  
heart. He saluted these relics of ancient

lively excited, and looked like a man of  
creation just after the flood. We like

hardly seems necessary or else the law  
of the race of geologists is to be perpetuated.

tion in which they find it necessary to in-  
crease a movement looking to the re-  
duction of extravagant expenditures in  
marriage ceremonies.

The ladies gallery in the English Par-  
liament, which has always used to be crowd-  
ed, has been completely deserted during  
the present session. Either politics are  
getting unfashionable or else the law  
makers are getting homely—the latter  
most likely.

The head of the family is about to eat  
an apple. Mother—"Say, father, give  
me a piece." Daughter—"Oh, father,  
live me a piece." Son—"O, father, I  
want a piece." Sister—"Fool, you  
please give me a piece, too." Father  
(disgusted)—"Here, the rest of you take

Germany is entangling down expenses ma-  
terially in its diplomatic service, super-  
fluous attaches of Legation being recalled  
all around the board. On and after Jan-  
uary a first-class German Embassy will  
consist of the Ambassador, two secretaries  
and two attaches only, instead of  
four, as at present.

The late Dr. Fletcher was preaching an  
evening sermon to a crowded audi-  
ence in Edinburgh, when a note was  
handed up to him to intimate that if Dr.  
So-and-so was in church he was urgently  
wanted. Having read the note, and seeing  
the doctor move off, he immediately  
added, with great fervor, "and may the  
Lord have mercy on his patient!"

In a southwestern town recently, a  
man fell into a ditch on the outskirts. A  
pedestrian helped him to his feet, and af-  
ter the thing had been accomplished, out

there." The stranger looked at him

## One of the most distinguished Eng- lish women, and one whose works are well known and much admired in this country, has been removed from this life.

Miss Agnes Strickland died on Monday  
at London at the age of 68 years. She  
was born at Baydon Hall, Suffolk, (Eng-  
land) was one of five sisters, all of whom  
have honorable places in literature.

Among the most stunning epigrams to be

of Commons.

The Earl of Yarborough, who has just  
turned up in Jersey, is about 40 years old;  
he is married and has several children.  
His estates are large and valuable; he is  
the patron of five living in the Estab-  
lishment, and he is a member of the  
Royal Society. All the same, he is so  
unhappy that he drinks to excess that  
often he gets into a state of total in-  
-sane.

The Pope eats strawberries in the  
fast day of St. Filippo di Nevi, which  
falls on the 21st of July, and after that  
the people enjoy them. He eats  
cherries on St. Monica's Day, and they  
are not ripe they are forced. The first  
figs come when the sweet lavender is  
in full bloom, and the figs are eaten on  
the day of St. Maria Maddalena, the 22d  
of July.

June 29th a woman named Frances  
Stewart suffered the death penalty in  
London for murdering her grandson,  
only 13 months old. She had been living  
with her son-in-law, but when he ex-  
-asperated a manner that he ordered her  
to seek a home elsewhere. Arowing her  
reputation, she took the little boy  
with her, and she was found dead in  
a room in the Thames. Although recom-  
-mended to mercy by the jury which  
convicted her, the crime was so heinous  
that the law was allowed to take its  
course.

It's a good thing to subscribe to Brad-  
shaw. Several promising mesalliances  
have been prevented by "information re-  
-ceived" in this way. Not long ago a  
stern parent instituted inquiries touch-  
-ing a person who was solemnly engaged  
to his daughter. The party looked well,  
well cut, a tremendous figure, and was  
emphatic to a degree seldom seen in  
a hotel clerk; but Bradshaw said:  
"Bad lot; no money; fond of liquor;  
plays cards Sunday; has a wife and five  
children West; once forged his uncle's  
name, but got the matter corrected on  
account of the family." Bradshaw's in-  
-formation is appalling.

Mr. Gladstone not only employs the  
time afforded by his temporary absence  
from public life in literary work, but he  
has recently appeared at Queensferry  
near his country seat, Hawarden Castle,  
in the capacity of lecturer. He lectured  
upon the subject of a coal strike, and  
pointed out the owner of an adjoining  
colliery and his men. The colliers had  
struck, and the owner of the colliery  
demanded the discharge of  
150 men, and the colliers were  
determined to resist to the last.

Love-Crazed—An Old Wretch.  
A terrible tragedy recently took place  
at Margville, Cal. Two men named  
Shirley and Henry Price were neighbors.  
The latter had a daughter named Eunice,  
about 17 years old, whom Shirley, who  
was about 60, wished to marry. He  
managed to become Price's creditor to  
the amount of \$44, and going to the  
house of the latter, he demanded the pay-  
-ment of the debt or his daughter,  
not having the money, but being deter-  
-mined to give him a stock of turkeys for  
payment at least. This was unsatisfac-  
-tory, and Shirley pulled a revolver from  
his pocket, and shot at her head, but  
it missed her, and the old wretch was  
thrown to the floor by Price and a negro  
boy, who was in the room. Mr. Price  
did not dare to shoot for fear he would  
hit the girl as well as the assassin, but  
he hit the girl with the butt end of the  
-musket without knocking him down. Then  
commenced a desperate struggle, in which  
Shirley was finally overpowered and  
bound. He is a man of considerable  
-property, and until this mad deed seized  
him had some reputation of being a  
-peaceable and quiet citizen.

Julius Janin.

Julius Janin is still the name that re-  
-ceives the prominent place in the  
-conversations of this Paris, and all the  
-contemporaries of this man have some-  
-thing to say either in the way of anecdote  
-or criticism. Says a correspondent: "His  
-handwriting was very bad, worse even  
-than that of Wm. Elder of St. John, a  
-very nightmarer for a printer, so illegible  
-that only two compositions out of the  
-whole staff of the *Debate* were able to  
-translate it. When he contributed to  
-other periodicals he always dictated his  
-work to Mme. Janin, who writes an ex-  
-cellent hand. One day he wrote a letter  
-to a friend, who, after much trouble, de-  
-ciphered two or three words which made  
-him think his correspondent must be  
-Janin. He immediately started for Paris,  
-saying, 'All here you are!' cried Janin on  
-seeing him; 'you have received my let-  
-ter at all,' replied the friend, 'I have  
-received it, and I've brought it here for
