STUDENT AID

INCREASED FEDERAL GRANTS FOR POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION

Mr. T. C. Douglas (Nanaimo-Cowichan-The Islands): Mr. Speaker, I should like to ask the hon. member's question to the alternative

Prime Minister whether his attention has been drawn to the fact that the University of Toronto and York University have been compelled to reject the applications of more than 18,000 students who applied to enter those universities this fall? In view of the fact that the report of the university presidents indicates that many thousands of high school graduates will not be able to gain admission to university this fall. I should like to ask the Prime Minister whether the government is giving any consideration as to how to deal with this problem, and particularly whether the government intends to increase federal grants for post-secondary education in order to provide accommodation for university students?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, as the leader of the N.D.P. knows, education is a matter of provincial jurisdiction and one in which the federal government has no constitutional competence. On the matter of shared grants with the provinces, the hon. member knows that we are now in the process of achieving ways under the constitution whereby the federal government with the consent of the provinces can participate in the type of shared grants to which he refers. Let me just remind the house that since the new arrangement made by the then minister of finance in 1966, the federal government has transferred several hundreds of millions of dollars to the provinces in the account of education.
