## President Eisenhower's Visit

November 13-14

The recent visit of the President of the United States to Canada's capital, afforded the public opportunities of brief glimpses of the popular former Supreme Allied Military Commander of the last war, and his charming wife

Not the first occasion on which an American chief of state has visited Canada, security arrangements were similar to those in effect during the Ottawa visits of former Presidents Franklin D.
