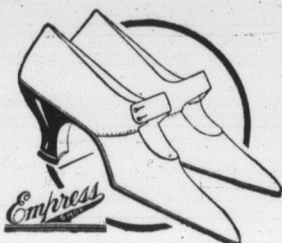

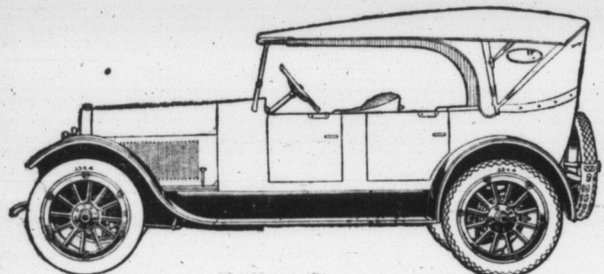

MONDAY'S REFERENDUM

The referendum to be submitted to the people of Ontario next Monday calls for an expression as to whether or not it is the desire to have the importation and bringing of intoxicating liquors into the province prohibited. Those in favour of prohibiting the importation will mark with a cross their ballot in the lower section printed "Yes"; those opposed to the prohibition, in the upper section printed "No." It is a simple ballot and no voter need be misled; if you are in favor of prohibition, vote Yes—if you are in favor of liquor, vote No.

For many years the war against the traffic in intoxicating liquors and its attendant evils has been waged with slow but sure success, and now it would appear that the decisive battle is about to be fought. Those who have watched events in the great struggle cannot deny that the country and the people are in every respect the better off for the fact that the drink evil has been greatly curtailed, and there can be no doubt that an entire clean-up of the traffic is most desirable. We hear much about the personal liberty feature of the question—the last argument apparently that is left for the anti-prohibitionist. If investigated, this argument will be found to have emanated from those engaged in the liquor business, and ought rather to be labelled "personal interests." He is a weak citizen and a weaker Christian who is not ready to sacrifice a little of his personal indulgences for the sake of a good cause.

BRITISH EDITOR'S OPINION

The Transcript has just received a booklet entitled "What British Editors Say about Canada", which has just been issued by the Canadian Department of Immigration and Colonization. It contains brief comments on Canada made by members of the Imperial Press Association who visited this country last summer. The booklet has been issued mainly for circulation in the Old Country, and readers of this paper may have copies forwarded to any friends in the Old Country who are interested in Canada by sending the names and addresses to the Director of Publicity, Department of Immigration and Colonization, Ottawa. No charge is made for the booklet or for postage on it.

The Globe, discussing the craze for amusement which seems to subvert every other desire, says: "The craze for pleasure at the expense of self-improvement, can only be combated by strengthening the agencies that create and foster a taste for higher things and tend to a more thoughtful outlook on life. The home, the church, the school and the public library are the principal institutions for the purpose. Amusement has its part, an essential one, in the training of the young, but with growing years it should be subordinated to the pleasure of the mind. The person who is fond of a good book, or has some intellectual interest or pursuit, is enjoying life much more than the individual who lives for pleasure alone."

By watching the advertising columns of a newspaper you are enabled to know the exact conditions of mercantile affairs and the general prosperity or depression in the town where that paper is published. You can sit at your desk and pick out the live business towns and the dead towns. There is no better index to a town than its paper. It is a better criterion to go by, and is considered more so by sagacious men than a photograph. It is the enterprise of the inhabitants and not the size of the buildings that make the town. You may pick up the paper and read at a glance, "We mean business," or "We're deadlier than a stuffed bird," as plain as though it were printed in a ten-line pica and red ink across every page.

AN ENEMY OF THE AGE

The drunken motor car driver, the scourge and terror of the streets and highways, epitomizes one of the arguments for prohibition. In this age of machinery, when the safety of scores of hundreds, even of thousands, may depend upon the brain and nerves of one man, alcohol is an enemy that society must crush in self-defence.

Total abstinence has for many years been enjoyed upon railwaymen for the protection of the travelling public. There was and is no soberer class, but there remained always the possibility that some man at the throttle or the switch whose head had been fuddled by liquor might launch a trainload of human beings into eternity. Hence the absolute necessity of teetotalism for all. Indulgence may not be permitted to the many who would not abuse it, because there are always the minority who will.

Today the number of persons who drive motor cars exceeds the number who are employed on the railways. The motorist needs a clear head and a steady hand. The drunken driver in the days of the horse might go to sleep on his seat, and the faithful animal would take him safely home. No such liberties may be taken with the motor car. The momentary loss of nerve, the slightest relaxation of vigilance on a city street, may involve loss of life. The driver need not be intoxicated to invite disaster. He simply cannot afford to drink alcohol in any form or in any degree. The motorman on the street car is under the same obligation. Even the pedestrian in these days of rapid traction can take no chances with intoxicants. There are great groups of men whose work demands from them the utmost steadiness and precision in handling mechanical appliances. More and more it is becoming a mechanized world. Less and less can the world tolerate so deadly an enemy of safety and efficiency as the liquor habit.—Globe.
