A further sixteen were found guilty of falsifying their I.D. cards in order to obtain a drinking stamp. Fines in most cases were \$25.00. It is hoped that the new requirement of N.B.L.C.C. cards will reduce the number of offences related to under-age drinking.

The Code establishes a Supervisory Board, which includes representatives from the Board of Governors and from student groups, a Commissioner for Student Discipline (the University Secretary), who is "responsible for the implementation and administration of the Code", and a Technical Advisor, who is usually a member of the Faculty of Law. It also details the membership of the Student Disciplinary Committee and the procedures to be followed in the laying of charges and
