

c) For Television Stations:

<u>Applicant</u>	<u>Station Location</u>	<u>Request</u>
The Windsor Daily Star	Windsor, Ont.	Television Station.

Reason: All television applications have been denied in the past in accordance with Board's policy, formulated December 19, 1936, namely: "The Board is not opposed to the establishment and operation of private television stations for experimental purposes only, provided that licences for such stations are restricted to those fully qualified technically and financially, and that the licences shall be subject to such terms of expropriation as the Board may deem advisable."

d) For Experimental Frequency Modulation and Shortwave Stations:

<u>Applicant</u>	<u>Station Location</u>	<u>Request</u>
Standard Radio Products	Kitchener, Ont.	Experimental FM and SW stations.

Reason: Applications for Frequency Modulation Licences have been recommended for denial in the past, as "It has been the Board's policy to recommend licences for Frequency Modulation only to those applicants who are engaged in the manufacture of FM receivers; that is, for test and experimental purposes.

The Board has always opposed the establishment of new privately-owned shortwave broadcasting stations.

The applicant in this case is a manufacturer of radio transformers and components, and it is the opinion of the Board that these component parts can be tested without putting transmitters "on the air".

e) For Facsimile Stations:

<u>Applicant</u>	<u>Station Location</u>	<u>Request</u>
The Windsor Daily Star	Windsor, Ont.	Facsimile Station.

Reason: It has been the Board's policy to recommend facsimile applications for denial in accordance with the policy of the Board formulated March 22, 1938, namely: "That no licence for facsimile broadcasting be recommended pending the formulation of a national policy with respect to it."

On February 20, 1938, "the Chairman reported that on a recent visit to New York he had witnessed facsimile transmission. He was of the opinion, and the Board agreed, that facsimile was of such far reaching importance that no rights should be granted to private enterprise. These rights should be retained for public domain."
