TWELVE BURNED TO DEATH.

C. P. R. FATALITY WEST OF FORT WILLIAM.

Victims Were Members of a Construction Gang, Whose Car Was Telescoped in a Collision—Several Others Were Terribly Burned, But Escaped by Breaking Their Way Out.

Fort William, May 7. — A terrible accident occurred at 1 o'clock yesterday morning, by which twelve men employed on a C. P. R. worktrain lost their lives. The train had been distributing ties along the track and was coming back. When about a mile out of Dexter Station a boarding car with twenty men on board jumped the track. The cause is supposed to have been a broken wheel. A flatcar telescoped the boarding car, which was overturned and caught fire, the flames spreading so rapidly as to hamper any rescue work.

Of the twenty men on the car only eight were rescued, the rest being probably stunned by the shock and then burned. Not a sound of pain was heard, so that it is presumed that all the twelve were at least unconscious when the fire reached them.

Dr. Hamilton, the C. P. R. surgeon, went up immediately by special train, and two more doctors followed later, but the latter returned on the delayed No. 2 express without reaching the scene of the accident, there being no need of their services.

The dead are:—Fred Pluk, G. Dan-luke, Ivan Hudena, Murk Kurue, A. Watin, G. Sundmark, F. Bystron, L. Lesson, F. Hokman, A. Johnson, F. Erickson, A. Kumdell.
The injured are:—Joe Dupont, head hurt; E. Filiard, half scalp torn off, very weak from loss of blood; S. J. Gagnon, back and side hurt; B. Kundell, leg broken; F. Jacobson, badly injured on face and arms and body; A. Nolin, badly hurt back and spine; S. R. Walsh, hip dislocated. Others in the car ahead were: J. M. Stewart, foreman, slight scalp wounds; Geo. McCallum, timekeeper, wounded in the hand; Joe Jordan, workman, slightly.

All the above were employed on the tie gang. James M. Reid of Ashburn, Ont., travelling as a passenger, had an arm broken and shoulder dislocated. The car in which the men were was the sleeping car, and a flatcar was between it and the caboose.

When the accident occurred there was a big fire in the stove in this car, and immediately after the crash the entire inflammable contents, straw and bedding, burst into flames. One of the survivors states that only one moan was heard from the men who perished. In a few minutes, but long enough for seven men to crawl out, there was hardly anything left of the car, and only a few charred bones remained as witnesses to its human freight.

The dining car, which was ahead, was thrown clear across the ditch on the opposite side of the track, three of its occupants being slightly injured, but not enough to be brought down to Fort William.

TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.

British imports and exports for April showed decreases of \$11,988,000 and \$1,780,000 respectively.

Mr. Ed. Helder of Tilbury West lost his barn, five acres and several head of cattle by fire.

Walter Noyes, a Peterboro' boy, who was injured by a shunting engine on the railway, is dead.

Mr. Edginton's sawmill and cheesebox factory and Mr. Kaar's brick and tile works at Brownsville were destroyed by fire.

The annual meeting of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church closed its session at Guelph.

The question of appointments to the vacancies on the High Court Bench of Ontario has not been discussed by the Government.

A brass tablet to the memory of five former cadets who died in South Africa during the war will be unveiled at the Royal Military College.

In a letter to Capt. Logie of Hamilton, Sir Frederick Borden says no decision has yet been reached regarding a killed regiment for that city.

During disturbances at Sepros, Hungary, in connection with the election of Judges, the gendarmes killed four and wounded several rioters.

A by-law to raise \$55,000 for school purposes was carried at Winnipeg, and another setting apart \$100,000 for the erection of a contagious disease hospital was lost.

Major-General Baden-Powell has cabled to Adjutant-General Corbin, U.S.A., a denial of reports crediting him with publicly criticizing the United States cavalry.
