GENTLEMEN: -- 1 beg to offer you my very sincere thanks for the honor which you have done me in associating my name with the toast, and with the health of " Her Majesty's Ministers." Her Majesty's Minisisters will be highly gratified when they learn that their names and their offices are held in such esteem, regard and memory by their fellow countrymen residing in the United States. I, myself, gentlemen, in my own personal capacity, am sensible that am undeserving of the acclamations

Gentlemen : The office which I have the done me the honor to wish me well, is one which has been familiar to my hopes and of the great American continent. wishes from a very early period of my life and services.
