LONDON, Aug. 23.—Is the loss of

That is a question raised in a
recent suit for breach of promise
the jury taking the negative and
awarding to the girl \$125 damages.
Hugh Chapman, of the Chapel Royal,
Savoy, disagrees with the verdict.
"Of what use," he asks, "would a
woman be in a workman's
home? He has to work for a living,
and he naturally wants a wife who
will be an asset, not a burden.
There is not room for sentiment and
delicate romance in the homes of
the poor. They cannot afford to
love. Marriage on a low wage is
more of a practical fact than a
pleasant dream."

GIRL'S BRAIN NO BETTER
THAN Y'S AT 21

So Testifies Professor Before
Royal Commission in
London, Eng.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—"Is a woman
at 21 more fully developed, mentally,
than a man at 21?" was one of the
questions put to Dr. Herringham,
vice-chancellor of the University of
London, by the royal commission on
the civil service.

"In some ways a girl is much ahead
of her brother, but I do not think
she is in intellectual strength," re-
plied the vice-chancellor. "She is
much less ahead of her brother in
those ways than she used to be be-
cause she is taking on her brother's
education and as a rule has not got
as strong a mind or brain as her bro-
ther has." He did not see why a girl's
intellect should not grow with ad-
vancing years just as a boy's mind
did.

AMERICANS WILL
HEAR REAL EARL

English Titled Man Plans to
Give Talks in Varsity
Towns.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Americans will
soon be listening to a real live earl,
possessing one of the most famous
English titles from the lecture plat-
form.
Lord Lytton intends to give some
lectures on Bulwer Lytton and his
times. The first lectures will be de-
livered in England, and later he will
swing the circle of the principle
American varsity cities. The Earl
of Lytton is of course a grandson
of the famous novelist but never
saw him, as he was not born until
three or four years after Bulwer
Lytton's death. Lord Lytton, who
has come rather prominently before
the public as an advocate of votes
for women, is a brother of Lady
Constance Lytton, the suffragist; of
Lady Betty Balfour, who is an
author herself, and Lady Emily
Lytton, the wife of the well known
architect of that name.

Many well known women of title
and position have taken up nursing
seriously in recent years. There
are for instance, Priscilla Lady An-
nesley, who has done good work
in a Dublin hospital, and Lady
Hermonie Blackwood, the president
of the Irish Nursing Association.
Lady Katherine Stanhope, Lady Sybil
Grimshaw, Lady Griselda Cheape,
Lady Rosalind Northcote and Lady
Maud Keith-Falconer are all num-
bered among society's "Florence
Nightingales." Lord Dunedin's
daughter-in-law, Mrs. Ronald Mur-
ray, did some conspicuous work as
a nurse in South Africa and Lord
and Lady St. Aldwyn's handsome
daughter, Lady Keene, was a pro-
fessional nurse before her mar-
riage. Two society women who have
a nursing home of their own are Miss
Keyser and her sister, Miss Agnes
Keyser.

ELECTRICITY IS BOON
TO PAINLESS SURGERY
French Scientist's Invention May
Mean Total Banishment of
Anæsthetics.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—One of the
greatest scientific discoveries for the
relief of suffering since Lister found-
ed antiseptic surgery, this description
fits the latest electrical apparatus if
all that is claimed for it can be per-
formed.
There is being demonstrated in
London a wonderful apparatus—an
intricate thing of glittering metal
work, coils and switches—which, it
is said, may mean the banishment of
anæsthetics from the operating room
for minor operations.
The apparatus is the invention of
Professor Leduc, a French scientist,
and briefly its purpose is to render
a patient locally insensible to the
pain of an operation by applying
electric current to the part of the
body to be operated on.

DUCHESS LEADER
OF A NEW PARTY

Lady of Marlborough May
Back a Socialist in
England.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—The Duchess
of Marlborough, who was Miss Con-
stello Vanderbilt, of New York, has
consented to act as chairman of the
new Women's Municipal party. This
organization, in future municipal
elections, will ignore party lines to
such an extent that the American
duchess may appear as the backer
of a socialist candidate.

Dr. Clifford Mara Dead.
LONDON, Ont. Aug. 22.—Dr. Clif-
ford Mara, dental surgeon, died here
early this morning from a mysterious
case of blood poisoning contracted at
Pittsburg early last spring, due to
vaccination. Dr. Mara was 35 years
of age. He was a graduate of Pennsylv-
ania University Dental School, and
had practiced in Toledo and Pitts-
burgh.
