NO EXCLUSIVE FRANCHISE

Yukon Council Declines to Pass Bill With Monopolistic Features—Newlands Effectively Answers Clarke's Objections re Ordinance No.33.

Several very interesting happenings might have been recorded yesterday during the meeting of the Yukon council, that is if they had been regarded as of sufficient importance to have taken the time to put the events on paper. One was the grand oration made by Clarke with his famous resolution concerning the little matter of the printing of ordinance No. 33, that which has furnished the editor of the News with so much harmless thunder in the past few months. The entrance of the honorable gentleman was very dramatic as was also the little speech which he bestowed upon the Nugget. Mr Newlands' reply was most effective and convincing.

Thompson presented a petition handed him but a short time previous. It was, from the residents of Fortymile asking that a bridge be constructed across the slough from the town of Fortymile to a connection with the road leading up the Fortymile river.

Clarke again brought up his resolution concerning this exclusive slaughtering franchise desired by Allan Cameron. The effect of the resolution is that the commissioner be employed to enter into a contract with Allan Cameron or any other person for the establishment of public abattoirs throughout the territory to be erected and operated under the supervision of the medical health officer. In speaking to his motion Clarke said he feared that among the members there existed a sort of misapprehension as to the purports of the bill. It was not for the purpose of establishing a monopoly, but was to create a public slaughtering house where all the meat consumed in this vicinity might be killed under the supervision of the health officer and in the most thorough hygienic condition. The house was to be built for the benefit of all the meat men and not for one alone. He also stated that the petitioner had petitioned for the franchise he now asks for over a year ago and had remained in the city under a certain indefinite promise that such would be given him. He had already spent a considerable sum on an establishment such as he proposed to erect and maintain. The medical health officer has already condemned the present methods of handling meat intended for human consumption. A denial was given to the reported statement that the Pacific Coast Storage Company was back of the petition, the speaker insisting that practically the only opposition that has appeared was that which had had its origin with that company. The matter of fees would be entirely in the hands of the commissioner.

Newlands objected to any exclusive franchise being given for anything of any purpose. The same petition was presented to the council at the sessions last year and he had voted against it for that reason. As far as the resolution now before the council was concerned, he had no objection to it as it confers on the commissioner no greater or increased powers over that which he now possesses. That being the case he had no objection to it whatever.

Thompson also went on record as being opposed to any and all monopolies, holding that no exclusive right should be given to anybody. He agreed, however, that the abattoirs should be kept under the inspection of the medical health officers.

Pringle was opposed to the resolution upon the ground that there was apparent in the motion an intention to give a monopoly to one man, otherwise why was the name of Cameron inserted in the motion?

Dugas likewise could not agree with the terms of the resolution. Why was Cameron's name mentioned? If it had not been, he would not have opposed the motion.

Low also took a fall out of the scheme. He was more than surprised that his honorable friend, the senior member for No. 1, he who had all along so bitterly opposed all sorts, kinds and conditions of monopoly, that he should now come out in favor of such, the creating of one. The member also called the attention of the council to the fact that if the resolution as endorsed and a bill drawn and was passed, a medical health officer would be required in every centre of population in the territory.

Girouard considers that the present law fills all requirements necessary at present. The commissioner can now issue a slaughtering house license only upon the recommendation of the medical health officer.

In fact, the bill as settled was \$15 less per page than has been the cost of printings of the ordinances of the territory.
