NO MORE LICENSES.

Hon. Mr. Hanna, when asked as to the general policy the department was likely to pursue in regard to the granting of licenses in those municipalities in which local option by-laws, which have been duly passed by the three-fifths majority, have been quashed on technicalities, said:

"Where this state of affairs occurs in New Ontario, when the Government themselves have the veto power, we have not issued licenses. In older Ontario, where the boards of license commissioners have the issuing of the licenses, it is generally, I think, understood that the desire of the Government is that where the by-law has been passed by a vote of the people their wishes should be respected. In the case of Midland, we were asked by the board whether, in view of the fact that the majority of the board were against granting licenses, we should approve of that course of action, and we informed them that we did approve. You may say that, so far as the Government is concerned, we will also approve of that course being taken by the boards of all the municipalities where the by-law has been quashed."

This may be considered to practically settle the question that no licenses will be granted, for it is hardly likely that any board will act contrary to the expressed views of the department.

When ice cream is sold on Sunday in a bona fide restaurant or eating house, Magistrate Jeffs holds that it is not a breach of the Sunday law, ice cream being a food. The inference is that if one who does not keep a restaurant or eating house, sells the food called ice cream on Sundays he breaks the law. And what we would like particularly to know is whether it would be a breach of the law for a man who is not the keeper of a restaurant or eating house to sell beefsteak or pork and beans on Sunday, to some hungry wayfarer—Hamilton Spectator.

For New Floors.

To stain new floors, first brush over with a fairly weak solution of glue and water. When the floor is quite dry, take two ounces of permanganate of potash and dissolve in a half gallon of boiling water. Brush this over the part to be stained. If not quite dark enough, give a second coat. Let it dry again and polish with beeswax and turpentine.

To Save Potatoes.

Wash potatoes thoroughly and then remove a narrow ring of skin right around from top to bottom, leaving the sides covered. Boil or steam the potatoes as usual, and when cooked take off the left on skin. It will be easily done, hardly anything will be thrown away, the nourishment of the potatoes will be retained, and the trouble of paring them will be nil.
