Municipal Parliament.

The newly elected Municipal Councillors for the County of Kings, assembled for their first January session at the Court House in Kentville, on Tuesday, January 10th, 1899.

The Councillors elect were all present at or shortly after the opening of the session, except Mr. Joseph A. Kinman, of Ward 4, who is seriously ill.

The result of the election held in November was announced by the clerk who proceeded to call the roll of the elected councillors, and administered the oath of allegiance and oath of office to those present.

The election of Warden was the first business in order. Mr. W. E. Ross, Councillor for Ward 3, was chosen upon the first ballot, receiving also ballots out of eleven deposited.

Mr. Ross was sworn into office, and addressed the Council, thanking them for the honor conferred upon him and outlining the work before them.

Councillor Curry was chosen as

Aylesford—Balcom, Gaul, Taylor.
Minutes of last day's proceedings, April term, and of special session held Sept. 19th, 1898, were read and approved.

A letter was read from Mr. C. I. Wolfe declining to act as Scout Act Inspector for another year.

The accounts of the Scout Act Inspector being called for, it was found that the expenses of prosecution for violation of the Canada Temperance Act during the past year amounted to \$211.02. The Inspector's salary \$150.00 makes a total of \$361.02 direct expense to the county treasury of the checking of the illegal sale of liquor. No fines had been collected, and a very considerable charge appears in the jailor's accounts for board of Mike McFadden committed to jail in default of payment.

The Warden explained that it would be necessary to appoint an Inspector. If this Council failed to make the appointment the Governor in Council would name a person for the office.

Coun. Reid asked if the county would be safe if the office were left vacant for one day. It was decided to run the risk.

Coun. Thomas moved, seconded by Coun. Campbell, that Wm. A. Kinman, J. Manning Lamont and Willard Hilsley be appointed overseers of Poor for the township of Cornwallis.

Coun. Cook, seconded by Coun. Anthony, moved in amendment that Messrs G. W. Kinman, G. Henry Hill and Lee Kinman be appointed.

Coun. Campbell spoke at some length in support of the motion, showing that a balance to the credit of the township of Cornwallis some year ago had disappeared, and that the cost of supporting paupers had increased from 83 cents to \$1.05 per week.

Warden Ross stated that the assessment had decreased from \$2,800 to \$2,000, which accounted for the wiping off of the balance, that the increase in cost of maintenance was caused, the overseers claimed by extravagance and bad management at the Poor Farm, for which they were not directly responsible, the man in charge being an appointee of the former board, and that the cost of outside relief had decreased.

Coun. Campbell stated that he had information that the auditors had made a report some years ago upon the accounts of the Cornwallis Poor Farm which report was so damaging that it had not been printed.

The Warden called Mr. Campbell to order, explaining that such charges should not be made without the sanction of the auditor being given.

Mr. Campbell named Mr. Young as his authority for the statement.

The further consideration of the matter was deferred to the afternoon sitting.

Mr. A. Stanley Masters was re-appointed clerk to oversee Cornwallis an amendment that Mr. G. Whittfield Coffin be appointed, being lost.

Mr. H. Neary was appointed to the same office in Horton, and Mr. G. O. Jacques in Aylesford.

Edward J. L. Bishop, of Annapolis, was appointed a member of the Board of Revision and Appeal in place of Stephen Taylor, elected Councillor for Ward 12.

It was moved that H. B. Witter be a member of the Board of Revision and Appeal for the coming year.

Coun. Curry thought the appointment of a Board could be dispensed with for this year, and after some discussion the consideration of the matter was deferred to Wednesday morning session.

Coun. Taylor was named chairman

of the Board of Health for Aylesford. Joseph Moriarty was appointed Surveyor of Highways in Dist. 26, Ward 12, in place of R. Stark, and Wm. P. Sullivan, in Dist. 31, Ward 14, in place of F. Bossel.

A number of road petitions were received and referred to committee on Roads and Bridges.

On motion Thomas Lawson was granted the privilege of erecting telephone poles along the highway from Waterville to Buckley's Corner and west to the residence of Chas. R. Calkin, under the supervision of Councillors for Wards 5 and 13.

The R. W. Kinman Co., Ltd., was granted leave to erect telephone poles along the highway where necessary between Canning and Woodside, under supervision of Councillors for Ward 1.

Daniel MacAnally and J. Hanley Chesley, of Ward 12, asked that they might be permitted to do their statute labor on private roads leading from the highway to their houses.

Warden referred Councillor Taylor to the bye-law under which such applications are to be decided by the Councillor for the Ward, whose certificate is to be handed to the surveyors.

Report of J. Donnellan, Commissioner to lay out road running east from John Donnellan's to Ogilvie wharf, read and referred back to Commissioner, in order that the law may be complied with in regard to the appraisal of damages.

Report of J. S. Woodworth, Commissioner of road passing Davidson's mill, in Berwick, being continuation of Front street, read and referred back to Commissioner, in order that the law may be fully complied with.

Report of Arch. Foster, Commissioner on road near MacMaster's mill, in Ward 10, damages \$20, read and, on motion, proceedings confirmed and road established.

Report of Board of Revision and Appeal read, showing that the assessment of Ward 1 had been increased 4 per cent.; of Ward 2, 6 per cent.; of Ward 4, 2 per cent.; of Ward 9, 6 per cent.; Wards 5, 6, 7, 10, 11, 12 and 14 were confirmed as assessed by the local assessors. The roll for Ward 13 was referred back to assessors, who made a new roll which was confirmed by the Revising Board.

Council adjourned.

AFTERNOON SESSION.
Council met at 2 o'clock.
The motion to appoint Messrs W. A. Kinman, Lamont and Hilsley Overseers of Poor for Cornwallis, was, after discussion, put and lost, Cornwallis only voting.

The amendment was then put and carried, and Messrs G. W. Kinman, G. H. Hill and Lee Kinman were declared chosen.

The Overseers of Poor for Aylesford and Horton were re-appointed.

A letter was read from Mr. D. M. Dickie, Registrar of Deeds, in regard to the building in which records are kept. Mr. Dickie stated that the building was not fire proof, was too damp and too small.

The Warden spoke in reference to the impotence of the subject referred to by Mr. Dickie, and spoke further in reference to the records of the Probate Court and of those in custody of the Prothonotary and clerk of the County Court, which were absolutely without protection.

On motion of Councillor Bishop, it was resolved that a committee be named to take such steps as may seem advisable for the safe keeping of the public records of the county, to report at the April term. Councillors Bishop, Campbell and Taylor were named as

such committee.

The Warden drew the attention of Council to the desirability of a change in the law under which Justices of the Peace give orders on the County Treasurer for payment of constable service in criminal cases, and also in the system which has grown up of Constables who attend Supreme Court receiving payment on certificate of officials of the Court.

A motion of Coun. Reid that a committee be appointed to secure the appeal of the law referred to, (Appendix A., Sec. 60, Chap. 161, Rev. Stat., fifth series) was then put and lost.

Report of S. W. Webster, Commissioner on road in Ward 4, near Cambridge Station, was read, and, on motion, proceedings confirmed and road established.

Report on pent road from Post road near Pen Sharp's to Caribon creek, E. Escam, Commissioner, read, proceedings confirmed and road established.

Report of J. S. Woodworth, Commissioner on road from Hall road to Lawrence road, in 8-sub Berwick, read. Report states that the damages claimed for such road would amount to between \$300 and \$400, while the resolution of Council, authorizing construction of the road, specified that the damages must not exceed \$100.

The report was received and applications for road refused.

Report re change in road at Harberville, damages \$25.00, Isaac Cook, Commissioner, received. Proceeding confirmed and road established.

Report re alteration in Ormsby road, three rods wide, 102 rods long, damages \$150, Arch. Foster, Commissioner, read, and, on motion of Councillor Taylor, consideration was deferred to April term.

Report re pent road from Ambrose Melnes' to J. L. Gertrude's, in Ward 7, read, stating that road was unnecessary, as a road which could be used had been laid out and paid for.

Coun. Anderson said that the cost of the new road desired would be less than the cost of clearing and opening the old road referred to.

Resolved that the papers be referred back to Commissioner, in order that the duties required of him by law may be discharged.

Petition to close road from Fall Brook road to B. Mahar's, referred to Committee on Roads and Bridges, which afterward reported not recommending that the prayer of the petition be granted.

Resolved that bridge over Cornwallis River, at Waterville, be placed under Bridge Act.

The bridge over the Cornwallis River on the Shaw road was also placed under the act.

Trustees of school lands for Cornwallis reported that they had made a sale of 15 acres of Dyke lands for the sum of \$1200 and asked that such be ratified. They were instructed to have deed prepared and submit it for consideration of Council.

Blijah W. Fox, of Ward 1, was relieved of Poor and County rates for one year on account of loss by fire.

Report of committees on property available for payment of expense of Lunatics in Mt. Hope from Horton and Aylesford was read. Horton reports some property available; Aylesford reports no property and no friends able to pay.

Reports of Auditors on Treasurer's accounts were read and a discussion arose in regard to balance of cash on hand supposed to be for the payment of outstanding claims against the county.

The list of nominations for County, Township and Ward offices having been read, it was resolved that the foregoing County, Township and Ward officers be appointed and that they are hereby appointed to the several offices to which they have been respectively nominated.

Mr. Wolfe was heard in reference to the appointment of an Inspector under Temperance Act.

Coun. Balcom moved seconded by Coun. Curry that Mr. A. D. Nichols, of Millville, be appointed Inspector. The consideration of the matter was deferred until Wednesday morning in order that Mr. Nichols might be consulted by telephone.

Standing Committees were appointed as nominated by Warden. Proceeding confirmed and adjourned until Wednesday morning.
