Recipes.
CUBAN FRAPPLE.—Boil to a syrup one pound of sugar with a pint of water, and while it is hot pour over it the grated rind of half a lemon and half an orange. Add 2 cups of orange juice, one grated pineapple and half a cup of lemon juice. Pour one cup of boiling water on a gallon of good stout. Add that to the mixture when cool. Strain and freeze.

MUCK FRUIT CAKE.—One cup sugar, half cup lard or butter, one cup milk (milk will keep it moist longer) one pound currants or raisins, one cup of walnuts chopped fine, one teaspoon cinnamon, one teaspoon allspice or cloves, 1 teaspoon soda. Put all on stove and let come to a boil; then remove when cool add two and a half cups flour, one teaspoon soda. Bake to minutes.

Governed By Commission.

In The Garden.
The planting of the garden will proceed rapidly enough if the soil is in good shape beforehand, seed order and a definite plan is in mind. The garden soil should be rich, mellow and well drained. Land summer fallowed and heavily manured this summer would be ideal for vegetable growing next year.
Don't select a weedy plot for a garden with the expectation of cleaning it, as the weeds will very greatly increase the work. Better make a wholesale job of weed destruction by summer following such a piece and start the garden on a clean stretch.
It is a mistake to plant the same types of vegetables in the same spot every year; keep them moving to prevent insects and diseases from getting a foothold. And it is a mistake to forget that a garden needs plant food in order to nourish vegetables properly.
Plant very few kinds of seeds in beds, if any at all. Plant everything in rows which has the advantage in the case of a large farm garden, of permitting space for a horse and cultivator. If a whole row of one kind is not needed, sow as far as is wanted, then go right on with something else.
Don't sow everything at the same time. Some vegetables will stand the spring cold and may need to be sown early, while others are to be sown later. Some of the earliest crops to sow are peas, radishes, turnips, carrots, beets, parsnips, early potatoes, onions. Such other crops as corn, beans, peas, cucumbers, to mention are not out later as the season advances and danger of frost disappears.
