The Dominion Western Railway Charter

From a number of sources the question of the extension of time for this charter comes to view, but in all cases where there is an opportunity for the betterment of transportation facilities, the people are anxious to see this road come along and do some work as an evidence of good faith, and then a little later, when conditions have improved, build the road so that the long suffering settlers may have the opportunity to market their products without such an expense for delivery.

We note that "The Pincher Creek Echo" records the action of the Board of Trade there as being favorable to this proposed renewal of the Charter, which matter was to come before the Board of Railway Commissioners on the 12th, inst.

The Cardston people, it seems, were not excited concerning this subject in time for action to be taken, or undoubtedly there would have been resolutions passed favorable to the applicants as we are always ready and willing to help our friend and neighbors and the producers of this district to better railway facilities.

We look for oil developments in the Pincher Creek District this year, as from what information we have the drilling will be much shallower there than elsewhere in this south country. Whenever there are producing wells no fear but what the railroads will be racing each other to get into the fields and Pincher Creek will certainly be on the oil map as well as the railroad map in the near future. Success to them.

Better Horses

The finest specimen of a draft stallion ever brought into Cardston arrived last week being purchased by a trio of well-to-do farmers in the Woolford District. Evidently the tractor is not going to have the whole "right of way" as feed gets cheaper and gas goes higher. This is the pedigreed Belgian Stallion "Bismarck" a roan, weighing some 2350 lbs., and having the best set of legs under him that any of our judges here have seen on a heavy horse.

That he is an exceptionally fine animal is evidenced by his winning first prize in the class where ever shown in Canada, and he has been shown at Brandon, Saskatoon and Edmonton, as well as at several big shows in the States. He was imported by Finch Bros. from Belgium and came into Canada through the well known horse dealers, Vanstone & Rogers.

The men interested are certainly to be congratulated on their purchase—they are Messrs. A. W. Pitcher, S. Carlson and J. Woolford. The two first named brought in the horse from North Battleford and though he was five days on the train, he did not seem in the least affected by the journey. They are believers in the good draft horse and have something over forty head of brood mares to amply justify their purchase. Mr. Pitcher has been breeding Belgians for a number of years and now has two imported and eight home raised pedigreed mares of this kind. Such an importation is a credit to the district and to those interested as showing their faith in the horse, in the breed they favor, and in the country as rearing the best type of draft horse to be had. Success to the men who can back up their convictions so ably.

Drag The Roads

Work on the roads of the district will begin as soon as the weather conditions are favorable. Mr. Adam Hendry, who is in charge of this work, states that all roads are to be dragged just as soon as dry enough. This work will be greatly appreciated as after the frost goes out and they are deeply rutted it takes great deal of time under ordinary traffic for the grade to get in fair condition. As there will doubtless be more tourist travel by car this season than ever before, scarcely any other factor helps to commend our district more than do the good roads.

On and after Friday, April 15th, the Pound By-law in Cardston will be strictly enforced. Mr. Rasmussen is the new poundkeeper.

After many long waits, the undertaking of the Canal and Reservoirs for the United Irrigation District has assumed a definite shape. Our Member, Mr. Martin Woolf, has worked untiringly for the benefit of the people interested in this project, and by private letter dated April 8th, he gives the assurance that the matter is definitely and favorably settled.

It is now necessary to go through with the legal requirements when Mr. Woolf is assured that the money will be available for this undertaking.

The country it is proposed to thus make more productive is some of the best in Alberta. Under normal conditions it is far above the average for all ordinary farming, and now it will be absolutely sure in its returns, because of having the moisture when needed.

Good news is also sent by Mr. Woolf concerning the extension of the railroad from Macleod to Hill Spring as he is very hopeful that a part of the work will be undertaken this year. It is a matter of almost equal interest to our citizens and friends at Glenwood and Hill Spring to have transportation improved, as well as being their land under the aforesaid irrigation project. The great labor and expense of a sixteen to an eight-mile haul in order to reach an elevator has indeed been a burden for many years. Those who have been persevering and remained with their holdings now bid fair to come in to the reward for their long years of toil and waiting. Certainly all the people of the Cardston District will rejoice with them in the realization of their hopes.

Better Cattle

Messrs. T. Wm. and LeRoy Duce have been endeavoring to help build up our cattle herds in this vicinity for some years past. On Monday they loaded a car of pure bred bulls purchased at the recent Calgary Sale, which the senior member of the firm carefully selected.

These were all coming two years old and very growthy fine specimens. The bunch comprised two Aberdeen Angus, two Herefords, one red Polled, and one Short-horn. Duce Bros. are specializing in the Red Polled, and are keeping the one for their own use and Mr. Geo. A. Duce has purchased one of the black fellows, so that there are four still open to purchase. The present prices will justify every cattle man not supplied in obtaining good sires.

Cardston School Fair

The following is the prize list of the School Fair for the boys and girls of Cardston and district. This list is being printed now to give the teachers and kiddies lots of time to prepare their exhibits.

RULES

1. Entries must be the bona fide work of exhibitors and be certified to by teachers and parents if required.
2. Each entry to be marked by number only.
3. Only one exhibit may be entered by each pupil in any class.
4. Prizes will carry points as follows:
First Prize (Red) 10 points
Second Prize (Blue) 7 points
Third Prize (White) 4 points
5. Any or all prizes in any class may not be awarded where the number or quality of exhibit does not reach a definite standard.
6. Money prizes will be awarded at the discretion of the committee, according to the amount of funds at their disposal.
7. No entry fees will be charged.
8. No prize cards or exhibits to be removed until such time as will be fixed by the committee.
9. All entries for the pupils of any school shall be made by the teacher of that school at least three days prior to day of Fair.
10. All exhibits must be in hands of committee by 9 a.m. on day of the Fair.
11. Suitable prizes will be awarded to the school and individual obtaining the most points.
