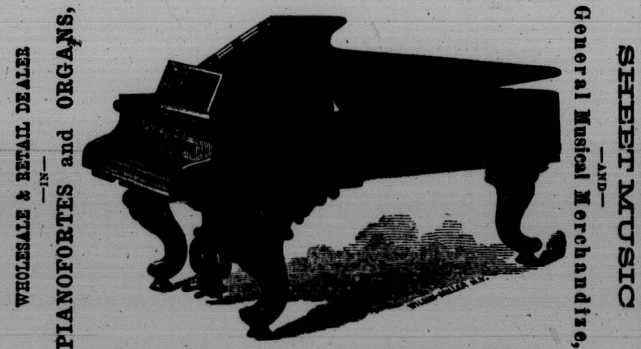

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## Advice to the New Members.

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## Notes on the Peace Congress.

LONDON, June 17.—A Berlin cor-  
respondent says that all the ques-  
tions which might threaten the success  
of the Congress are the organization of  
Roumania, England, with the united  
support of France, Austria, Turkey  
and possibly Italy, will advocate such  
an organization as will make Rouma-  
nia the Bulwark of Constantinople.  
For this purpose the Russians should  
be totally excluded and predominance  
given to the Greeks. A rupture would  
be almost inevitable in consequence  
of the prolonged discussion on this  
point. The friends of Russia assert  
that she will resist. The correspond-  
ent, who is generally well informed,  
considers the threats an attempt to  
frighten others.

The impression now is that Greece  
will be admitted to the Congress, if  
content with a consultative voice.

Another Berlin correspondent tries  
to discredit the Globe's report of an  
Anglo-Russian agreement. The same  
correspondent states that the Russian  
reply to Beaconsfield's speech at the  
opening of the Congress maintained  
that the presence of foreign troops  
alone prevented a revolution in  
Constantinople.

The discussion of the subject of  
the withdrawal of the Russian forces  
and the British fleet from the vicinity  
of Constantinople is not concluded.

The mobilization of the Austrian  
troops is assuming large proportions.

It is reported that a treaty signed  
in private talk, the mobilization of  
100,000 men to enforce the decision  
of Congress.

Roumania will abide by the decision  
of the Congress if allowed a hearing.  
Andrassy has a definite programme  
and speaks with much firmness in  
reference to the limits of Bulgaria.  
Neither France, Italy nor Austria are  
in favor of the cession of Batoum  
to Russia, fearing that England will  
eventually seek compensation in  
Egypt.
