HORSE AND BUGGY  
STOLEN MONTH AGO  
ARE BROUGHT BACK

Sheriff Hawthorn Recovered Stolen Property Near Harvey Station

A YOUNG ENGLISHMAN  
SOLD OUTFIT THERE

Later Is Said to Have Tried to Put Over Deal With a Bad Cheque at St. Stephen

A horse which had been hired from a local livery stable just about a month ago and was later stolen from a nearby resort was returned yesterday to its owner, having been recovered by Sheriff John B. Hawthorn, who located it between Harvey Station and McAdam Junction.

From what can be learned the horse and buggy was stolen by a young Englishman who has resided intermittently in the parish of Prince William for some years; at any rate he sold the animal and rig there and later went on to St. Stephen where it is said he had about completed the purchase of several horses for delivery in Calais, Me., when it was suddenly discovered that the cheque he had tendered was phoney and the deal was naturally off.

It is understood that in addition to the costs of his recovery the young man who had hired the horse is now confronted with paying a bill for its use for the month the animal has been away from the local stable.

Strawberries Drop to  
20 Cents by the Crate

Prices of cultivated strawberries have shown a big decline on the local market. A few days ago they were selling at 50 cents and even more a box, and today the stores are offering them at 25 cents while farmers are selling them at the doors at 20 cents a box and 20 cents a box by the crate. High prices for sugar are expected to affect the demand for strawberries here as in Ontario, where there is little demand for fruits for preserving.

PATRIOTIC FUND'S  
OFFICE TO CLOSE

Final Meeting of Committee Last Night and Last Applications Passed

A meeting of the general committee of the local branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund was held last evening at the Hotel of Trade Rooms and the committee decided that acting under the instructions of the head office at Ottawa, they should cease work on July 1st and in future all matters pertaining to the Patriotic Fund in this city, which has under its direction the counties of York and Simsbury, would be dealt with by the St. John office, which has been named as the provincial office for New Brunswick. The local office will close on July 31st.

At the close of the general committee meeting last evening, the relief committee met for the last time and passed eight applications for assistance under the fund, holding up one application which will be referred to the St. John office.

Fred B. Edgcombe, city ticket agent for the C. P. R., received word this morning that Murray T. Pearson, travelling passenger agent of the C. P. R. in this district, died last night at Houlton, Me., following a second operation for appendicitis.

Mr. Pearson was a native of New Brunswick, but had made his home at Houlton a number of years, having made his start in the passenger business of the railway in that town and continuing to reside there while travelling passenger agent in this district. He had a wide acquaintance all over New Brunswick and Maine, and his many friends will learn with deep regret of his death.

Besides his widow, who was a former resident of York county, he is survived by several children.

APPEAL FILED IN  
EFFORT TO OBTAIN  
ENGLAND'S RELEASE

Attorney General Is Served With Notice In Liquor Prescriptions Case

APPEAL CANNOT BE  
HEARD BEFORE FALL

Grounds for Move Hinge Upon Alleged Misdirection of the Jury

The Attorney General has been served with a notice of appeal in the case of Albert W. England, who was found guilty of uttering two forged prescriptions for liquor and sentenced to two years terms in the penitentiary at Dorchester by Justice Chandler at the June sitting of the Supreme Court.

The appeal was lodged by C. D. Richards, counsel for England, and E. Slipp and Hanson for plaintiff and is based upon the grounds that there was improper admission of evidence and that there was misdirection with respect to the right of the jury to find the defendant guilty irrespective of the date.

The second ground for the appeal hinges upon the question asked Mr. Justice Chandler by S. L. Morrison, foreman of the trial jury, as to whether the jury would be justified in finding the prisoner guilty of forgery if they were to find him guilty of forgery on March 18th, instead of March 18th, which was the date named in the indictment. When asked the question Justice Chandler answered that the jury would be justified in doing so.

The first ground for the appeal is that the admission into evidence of the testimony of Elbridge Hunter and Judson Hinchey relative to their obtaining prescriptions from McKay was improper.

Mr. Richards stated this morning that the appeal would be heard at the September sitting of the Appeal Court.
