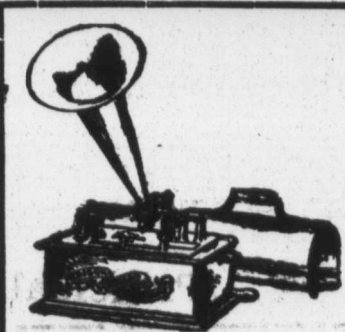

## IS THE I. C. R. TO BE SOLD

Powerful Syndicate Said to be Prepared to buy Government Road.

### PRICE \$30,000,000.

Montreal, Oct. 13.—The allegation that an offer is about to be made for the Intercolonial will not do down. As a matter of fact the statement is repeated here today with more persistence than ever.

The unauthorized declaration is now made that a powerful syndicate will offer \$30,000,000 for the government system. They will pay 3 per cent. annually on that amount, the restriction being made that ten years will be allowed to run before payment of interest commences.
