Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or the Agency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section adjacent his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties-Not more than six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to secure homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted the homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption right may purchase homestead on certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties-Not more than six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

TIGERS EASILY BEAT BURLINGTON. Are Now in Semi-Finals of the C. L. A.

At Victoria Park the deciding game of the Juvenile C. L. A. series was played Saturday between the Burlingtons and Tigers, of Hamilton, the Tigers winning out handily by a score of 6-1. The grounds were roped off and the spectators were kept off the field of play and both teams were given a fair show. At 3.30 Referee Saunders faced off the ball at centre, and the game was on. Both teams were putting up a strenuous game, the ball travelling from one end to the other with unflinching regularity. Both goal-keepers were putting up a splendid game. A few seconds after the whistle blew, Laing, of the Tigers, caught a quick pass and beat Allen, of Burlington, in goal, which was not allowed as the whistle had blown. In the first quarter the score was 0-0, the advantage slightly in Burlington's favor. In the second quarter both teams were doing better passing. A few minutes after the whistle blew, Sheppard, of Burlington, scored. This seemed to put the Tigers on their mettle, and a few minutes after the face off the ball was passed to Tiny Laing, who made the first score for Hamilton. At this stage the Tigers were playing splendid combination and after the face off, the Burlingtons got the ball and were carrying it down on the Hamilton defence with splendid combination when Olliver, who was playing second defence, intercepted the pass, carrying it down the field rapidly, passing it to Fickley, who notched the second goal for the Tigers. This was the prettiest play of the whole game, and brought the large crowd to its feet. This ended the scoring in the second quarter. The score at half time was 2-1, in Tigers' favor. The Burlingtons, who had been putting up a good defence game, and knowing that if they lost that their chances for the district were gone, went back on the field at half time, determined to win. After the face off, it was only a short time until Lisson was knocked out and carried off the field, Stuart taking his place as centre. A few minutes after the second quarter, the ball was passed out to Tiny Laing, who scored the third goal for Hamilton. This seemed to have taken the ginger out of the Burlingtons, and from then on they tried to play a defence game. At the face off, Stuart carried the ball down and after a few passes got through the Burlington defence and scored. At the finish of the third quarter, the Tigers were 4-1. In the fourth quarter, at the face-off, Stuart, who was playing centre, seemed to have found his natural place, with Olliver and Fickley supporting him at the defence, the game was carried down into the Burlingtons' quarter. After several passes around the Burlington goal, Stuart bulged the nets for Hamilton again. At the face-off, the ball was carried down on the Burlingtons' defence, who were putting up a very strenuous game, but they were not getting much assistance from their home field. After a hard struggle, Stuart got in again for another goal. This was the last goal, game ending 6-1 in Hamilton's favor. Dodman, in the goal for Hamilton, did not have very much to do, except in the first goal, which Burlington scored, which was practically a fluke of a back-handed grounder, which usually deceives a defence and goal tender. Fickley, Olliver and Stuart, on the defence, put up a wonderful game. Lisson was playing a good game until knocked out. Murphy, Laing, Watt and Brady, on the home, put up the nicest combination work that has been seen yet. Tiny Laing seemed to have the favor of the crowd. This win of the Tigers puts them in the semi-finals in the C. L. A., something that has not occurred for a long time in Hamilton. The Burlington team put up a splendid game half time, then they seemed to fall away, Sheppard, on their defence,

Montreal, Aug. 9.-Frank Lukeman did 100 yards on Saturday in 9 5/4 seconds, equalling the Canadian record. The races were pulled off during the lacrosse match between Cornwall and Montreal, and excited a good deal of interest. The conditions were ideal for fast time and Lukeman was in fine form.

RUSSELL ARRESTED.

Frank Law's Partner in Custody at Lima, Ohio. Toledo, Ohio, Aug. 8.-William L. Russell, of Lima, O., was arrested there to-day, under orders from United States Marshal Chandler, of Cleveland, awaiting the arrival of a deputy marshal from Toledo with the proper warrant. He is wanted in Toronto where eleven warrants are out for his apprehension, charging him with conspiracy to defraud and with obtaining money under false pretences in connection with the wildcat mining schemes engineered over a year ago by the firm of Law & Company, of which Russell was a partner. Russell states he was in Europe at the time of the misdeeds charged by the Government, and will fight the Toronto case to the bitter end.
