A NY person who is the sole head of a famliv, or any male over 18 years old, may nomestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Akency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or slater of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his faither, mother, son, daughter, brother or slater.

His country's future will be discussed by Mr. O'Connor before Irish-Americans from now until Nov. 10, for that is what brought him to the United States to-day on the Lusitania. "King Edward has foreknowledge of the crisis that may confront him and "King Edward has foreknowledge of the crisis that may confront him, and the measure of his recent activities is a measure of his anxiety. The present Government would pass by 300 votes in the House a home rule bill for Ireland, were they not withheld by a conviction that the peers would promptly veto it. Therefore they will not waste time on a bill sure to be killed, when there is so much other important legislation pending.

"But if the present Government is sus "But if the present Government is sus-tained at the polls they will demand of the peers a right of suspensory veto. That is, a bill passed by the House may still be rejected by the Lords, but if the House again passes it in the face of this rejection the bill shall forthwith become law.
"You ask me why the peers will grant this concession. Because, if they refuse it, the Premier, with the country behind him, would say with all respect to the

measures that come up to them from a Tory Ministry.

"King Edward does not wish to face the crisis I have suggested. He is trying to compromise the situation, to bring the peers to a realization of their embarrassment. Whether he wins or loses, Ireland cannot lose, If she rises to her opportunity home, rule is her, within
