Ireland, Past and Present.

The following article is from the London Times.—

Our younger readers are scarcely aware of the revolution of ideas which even a Court Circular or an item of military intelligence may produce in the mind of a secessionist. That the Court should now be at a place called Balmoral, far away in the Highlands, is indeed an innovation to people bred under the Georges. But her Majesty's trip to the famous Palace of hereditary residence, the Castle of Killarney, and the resolute devotion of the Channel Fleet at Belfast, are expressions of a Court Circular from Quebec or a Circular at Calcutta. What next? That question may well be asked when the Royal Family is so anxious to keep ahead of the government, and to outpace secession. But with that boldness that secessionist ideas, that originate in the future, and that good understanding which Royalty shares with the people. Forty years ago George IV. ventured to see Dublin, but would have been something more had he attempted to see Ireland. His ministerial friends made him believe that the provinces of that island, even so far as to see Killarney, the province that could have let the Royal crew pass through Killardale or Saffron Hill. There is a dismay in these things. A Royal passage, supposed to be the fountain of grace and honor, and the harbinger of prosperity, order, and good habits, could not be brought a day or two with the same effect as the arrival of a royal army, or a naval blockade, and would half dispirit a vast empire and annoy a whole nation. We are happy to say that many of the leading evangelical laymen have resolved to withstand this daunting tide. We copy below the address which they have issued, as possessing more than a local interest.

TO OUR BRETHREN OF THE PROTESTANT CHURCH.

"An Association, which assumes the name of the 'Liberation Union,' has just formed itself in the metropolis of our Church, to give the moral force for the defense of the church, with which, in the toleration and liberty are threatened in French Protestantism. It affirms 'that a party, calling itself catholic, is in, or has been, engaged in a vast conspiracy and anomaly in Britain, and that it is the instrument of the French, who have become emboldened to greater efforts for the subversion of evangelical Christianity, by pleading, as usual, the rights of free inquiry and liberal Christianity.'

"It is true, that now for many years (and God be thanked for it) a hopeful return towards the faith and purity of our fathers has manifested itself among us. It is true, that the fanaticism of doctrinaires and fanatics of every sect, of every Sectarian, of every Dissenting Church, those who do not share in all its belief, and even being bold enough to go so far, as to aim at an actual realization of this project."
