THE BISHOP OF IRINA.

SOLENCE CONSECRATION CEREMONY—THE ARCHBISHOP'S SERMON.

Very solemn, in its long history, did the venerable old Cathedral of St. Dunstan's—a more royal and brilliant assembly of princely prelates, devout priests and distinguished laymen, than that which assembled within its walls on Thursday last, the 28th ult., to witness and take part in the consecration of H. B. Rev. James Charles Macdonald, Bishop of Irina, and Coadjutor to the Bishop of Charlottetown. All professions and all differences of opinion, whether religious or otherwise were laid aside on this occasion; and all classes and creeds united together, both to honor the man, and to testify their appreciation of his exalted dignity.

The lowering murky clouds of early morn, which belobbed everything but a pleasant day, were at a sombre hour, one after another chased away from theirullen thrones, to give place to brilliant sunshine. Long ere 9 o'clock, the hour appointed for the commencement of the celebration, every available seat in the Cathedral had been taken up by a large and expectant assembly, who had come to witness the imposing ceremony. In the sanctuary a spacious altar had been erected and prepared on a plane with the consecrating Bishop's throne, for the use of the Holy Eucharist, during the first part of the services. The main altar presented a very beautiful and artistic appearance, having been tastefully decorated with various flowers by the ladies of the City Hospital. In the sanctuary and sacristy the following preparations were made for the beginning of the consecration: On the main altar was placed a set of pontificals for the officiating prelate; on the temporary altar beside the officiating Bishop's throne, a set of pontificals and cope for the Bishop elect; on two stands ranged before the main altar were placed two copes for the two assisting Bishops; on a third stool standing near the Bishop's throne, to the right, was placed a cope for the use of the archpriest, and in the sanctuary were prepared three sets of dalmatics, mitres, albs, etc., for the 1st and 2nd deacons of honor, the deacon and sub-deacon of office and the cross-bearers. On the credence table standing at the apsidal corner of the main altar, were arranged, besides the necessaries for an ordinary pontifical mass, the holy chalice for the anointing of the new Bishop, and the offerings of bread, wine and candle, to be made by the newly Consecrated to the Consecrator after the offertory of the mass.

About 9 o'clock the prelates and priests formed in procession in the main hall of the palace, in the following order:

(1) 2nd master of ceremonies.

(2) Deacons, acolytes, lectors,

(3) cross-bearers.

(4) Visiting clergy, in cassock and surplice.

(5) The clergy of the diocese, simarly arrayed.

(6) Mgr. Blaikie and Mgr. Sweeney, in ecclesiastical vestments.

(7) His Grace Archbishop O'Brien, in robes and mantellæts.

(8) the arch-priest.

(9) His Lordship Bishop McIntyre, Consecrator, in cassock.

(10) 2nd deacon of honor; 1st deacon of honor.

(11) Train-bearer.

(12) Four acolytes for mitre, crosier, mace and bompas.

The prelates who did not take active parts in the services were all accompanied by their chaplains.

The procession filed out the main entrance of the palace, passed through the Dumaresque street gate and entered the Cathedral by the eastern portal. At the entrance to the Cathedral the procession was met by the Bishop elect, in robes and mantellæts, with Mgr. Rogers of Chatham and Cameron of Antigonish, as 1st and 2nd assisting prelates, respectively, standing on either side of him. How holy water was presented to the officiating Bishop, who first officiated to the prelates and then apointed over the people. After the sprinkling of the Holy Water, the processional having been joined by the Bishop and his suite moved along the eastern aisle, to the alter of the Sacred Heart, where all knelt in prayer for a few moments before the Blessed Sacrament. At a sign from the master of ceremonies, the clergy proceeded down the middle aisle, where chairs had been prepared for them, and the bishops and officers of the mass entered the sanctuary. After another short prayer before the main altar in the sanctuary, the Bishop ascended his throne, where with the assistance of the deacon and sub-deacon of office, he began to robe himself, in full pontificals for the celebration of Solemn High Mass; the Elect proceeded to his own alter, where he was vested in alb, chasuble, stole, cope and biretta; the assisting bishops took the stoles prepared for them, before the main altar, and the other visiting prelates occupied the chairs and prie-dieu, prepared for them in the sanctuary. It may here be opportune to give in detail the names and offices of those who took part in the ceremony. They were as follows:
