The "Grey" Crisis.

According to our messages, there seems to be quite a grave crisis in British Government circles, on the subject of the Foreign Secretary, Sir Edward Grey, and at the attitude of Britain towards Germany on the Moroccan crisis. Much of the message may be discounted largely as compiled in London for circulation in American newspapers, and this account for the references to Ambassador Bryce. It is hardly probable that the Ministry will offer Sir Edward as a victim to Germany, as the French Cabinet offered one of its ministers some years ago. The policy of the Minister it must be remembered was the policy of the Cabinet, and one of the most radical members of that Cabinet, Mr. Lloyd George, was put forward by the Government to give public expression of the policy of the Government towards Germany, and it was the speech of Lloyd George which roused the ire of Germany. Under such circumstances, it would appear that the Cabinet must stand or fall as a whole. Otherwise the Cabinet will show deplorable weakness. There can be no room for doubt that the House of Commons would back the Government by overwhelming majorities in this affair. The aspiration of the Radicals for an understanding is right and proper, but the singling out of Grey for sacrifice is an un-British way of going about it.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. MONTREAL, To-day. The fund for the relief of McGill University, which is being raised by a five days' whirlwind campaign, passed the million dollar mark yesterday, on the way to the fifteen hundred thousand dollar point, which the Committee must reach to obtain the hundred thousand dollar subscription of Robert Belford.

LONDON, To-day. Questioned as to the entry of Russian troops into Persia, in spite of the compliance of the Persian Government with the Persian ultimatum, the Foreign Secretary, Sir Edward Grey, stated in the House of Commons, yesterday, that while Persia has agreed to comply, the matter was not likely to be completed for a few days. In the meantime the Russian Government has assured the British Government that the despatch of troops is only a temporary measure taken in order to secure satisfaction.

LONDON, To-day. Sir Edward Grey, who during the earliest years of his occupancy of the Foreign Office, received almost the unanimous support of all parties, recently has been the object of continuous attack, not from the Opposition, but by the members of his own party or rather by the extreme Radical element of his party. The secrecy with which diplomatic negotiations have been carried on, aroused the ire of the Radicals. The disclosures regarding Anglo-German conversations in respect to Morocco, and the statements that the countries were on the verge of war, have given the Radicals another opening, and they are now understood to be pressing for the retirement of Sir Edward Grey, declaring "We won't be drawn into war without knowing the reason why." The Radicals favour an Anglo-German understanding and accuse Sir Edward Grey of balking their efforts in this direction, either by design or through the influence of anti-German officials at the Foreign Office. Should Sir Edward resign, Mr. Haldane, Secretary for War, and Mr. McKenna, the Home Secretary, will likely follow him. Ambassador Bryce is likely to be drawn into the controversy. He would be supported by the entire party. The lobby is full of rumors of other troubles besetting the Government. It is said in London quarters that the Cabinet will not be able to satisfy Mr. John Redmond's Home Rule demands, which have been created through fear of the influence of O'Brien's strength in Ireland. The Labourites are dissatisfied with the findings of the Royal Commission of last August in respect to the railway strike. They blame the Cabinet for the failure to secure recognition of the Unions. The Prime Minister, however, is under a moral obligation to avoid a crisis during the King's absence, but it may be beyond his power to do so.

Twenty-Five Hours on a Raft

Sole Survivor of a Crew of Eleven. Landed at Grimby yesterday by the German steamship Gretchen Muller. H. Frenneson, the mate of the Swedish barque Heeta, told a thrilling story of shipwreck. The Heeta, with a crew of eleven, was overtaken by Sunday's storm while in the North Sea.

The barque sprang a leak, had her boats and masts torn by the heavy seas, and drifted helplessly before the gale until she finally, on Monday morning, sank. The captain and all the crew had donned life-belts, and Frenneson stated yesterday that he saw his companions swimming about for a time in the heavy seas, but he of opinion that ultimately they all sank.

Frenneson saved himself by seizing a part of the barque's cabin as it drifted past. This made him a sort of raft. A sea chest which he also recovered he fastened to the raft, and made an improvised sail out of some canvas. He had neither food nor water, and owing to the heavy seas was unable to sit down on his raft. Drenched to the skin, he clung to the sea chest and drifted about for twenty-five hours, when the Gretchen Muller sighted him and picked him up. He was then in a very exhausted condition.
