The Canadian Naval Zone.

According to the cable message to day, some correspondence of local in-terest has been tabled in the Commons at Ottawa. This correspondence took place since the Imperial Conference in reference to the Canadian Navy. The principal feature of this is stated to be the objection raised by Newfoundland as to the encroachment of the Canadians zone in the territorial waters of Newfoundland. As we read the message, it would appear that this view was upheld by the Secretary for the Colonies. We presume that the correspondence setting forth this objection of Newfoundland will be tabled in the House of Assembly, and should prove interesting reading.
It may be remembered that this

view was set forth in the Evening Telegram on August 1st last, and on subsequent days. The Government press were at first silent, and then an attempt was made to ridicule the views, which it would appear afterwards became official.


