Redmond on Flag of Ireland

Speaking in reply to Mr. Balfour in tion of the Union Jack, in Ireland, Mr. John Redmond, the Nationalist leader, said

I go so far as to say, Mr. Redmond went on, that the object which the right hon. genetleman (Mr. Balfour, says ought to be entertained by all Irishmen-namely, that while cultivating their own separate nationality they should also be willing to share and to be proud of the wider nationality of the Empire- is the object of my hon. friend (Mr. Mc-Veagh), and is certainly the object of myself and my colleagues on these enches. (Ministerial cheers.) I was rofoundly impressed the other day by the speech made in the City of London by the right hon, gentleman in which he enumerated this very doctrine. I quoted his speech at ength at a Home Rule meeting a couple of days afterwards, and I concluded the quotation by saying, "That is my ideal. That is the ideal of Ireland." (Ministerial cheers.) What was the doctrine he laid down? It was that he was proud himself as a Scotsman of the separate nationality of Scotland, that the Canadians were roud of the separate nationality of Canada, and that the Australians were proud of the separate nationalty of Australia, and that they were all proud of being citizens of the Empire and of the wider nationality of of the Empire. He made no reference o Ireland. I say that is our ideal, nd I say the Irish people have been barred from the realization of that deal by the history of Ireland ever since the Union. (Ministerial cheers) say without fear of contradiction hat from the day of Wolfe Tone down o this moment there has been no eader of Nationalist sentiment in Iregrasp the ideal of separate nationlity combined with Imperial greatess and unity if he had been allow-

((heers.) been said that the Union Jack h een received from time to time mes of excitement with disfavor reland. Remember that the Union ack dates only from the Union 800. Everyone admits that the Unon, from that day to this, has been detested by the overwhelming majorty of the Irish people. (Cheers.) The ag created only as a symbol of that nion-I think myself naturally-in mes of great excitement has from time to time met with marks of disfavor. But after the passage of this bill it will no longer be the symbol of a hated and detested Union. It will be the symbol of a Union which the Irish people have frankly and fully accepted. (Cheers.) It will be the symbol of an Empire into which they will say for the first time they have been admitted on honorable and equal terms (Cheers.) It is nothing less than a stigma that by the terms of this amendment you should compel the Irish people to put on this or that building a flag which will be their flag for the first time after this bill is passed. (Cheers.)
