Terrible Affair.

Man Without Provocation Stabs Another in Abdomen — The Victim, John Hudson, Very Ill.

At 10 a.m. to-day a young man named Patrick Clarke, aged 23 years, without provocation of any kind, and without the slightest warning to his victim plunged a stilet knife in John Hudson's stomach on the right side and inflicted a wound of about two inches in length, through which the intestines protruded. Both work at the Smith Co.'s premises on which the stabbing took place, and Clarke's father is the night watchman there, while Hudson has been working at the place since Mr. Hickman took charge now several years ago. Clarke has been very deaf for some years and the belief is that this has more or less affected his mind, and he has had violent periods on several occasions. Saturday night officers O'Neill and Churchill were called to his father's residence, Lewis Square, where he was demolishing the furniture, and at his father's request arrested him the man resisting so violently that he had to be handcuffed. He was released this morning from custody, and his father on the advice of Dr. Cowperthwaite to who he spoke as to his mental condition advised him to have him re-arrested so that he might make an examination as to his sanity. The father was waiting at the station to-day about 10.15 to see the prison police authority to again have his son arrested as advised when the latter was brought into the station by Const. O'Neill and Tulk charged with stabbing Hudson. As to the particulars we got them from Mr. Hickman, of the Smith Co., Ltd. Hudson, who had been watching on the premises while the men were at breakfast between 8 and 9 o'clock, left to get his breakfast at 10. Clarke came on the premises shortly before 10 and just outside the office began to pace up and down in the yard with his head hung down as if thinking deeply. He was seen to have a sheath knife at his waist but no person for an instant deemed that he had intended to use it. Hudson came back from his breakfast at 10 a.m. and just as he entered the gate, Clarke drew the knife and plunged it into the lower part of his abdomen on the right side. He then walked quickly down the wharf holding the knife in his hand. Hudson sat down on some barrels of herring near and believed the other had only hit him with his fist, and complained to Mr. John Bogdan, co-owner of the premises, and a friend named John Jones, who witnessed the stabbing, that Clarke had knocked all the wind out of him. Soon after he said he would go home, and he started to walk across the yard when he became faint and fell, and had to be assisted to a seat on some barrels. Mr. Hickman, who came out as Mr. Bogdan ran to the injured man's aid, saw that he was seriously hurt, and opening his clothes found that a dangerous wound had been inflicted and that the entrails protruded. Despatching a messenger for the police, officers O'Neill and Tulk were soon on the premises, and finding Clarke with the knife still in him, overpowered him only after a stiff fight and handcuffed him and drove him to the station. Hudson was placed on some barrels and covered with a coat, and soon Drs. Roberts and Cowperthwaite, called by telephone from Mr. Hickman's office, were at his side. Little could be done for him, and the ambulance being summoned he was taken to the Hospital, where Dr. Knight examined the wound and did all possible for him. The man did not bleed much externally, but it was feared that there was internal hemorrhage and that his chances for recovery would be slim. At 2 p.m. he was doing as well as could be expected. The wound is a dangerous one, but the Hospital authorities be-

lieve that if no complications set in he may live. Hudson is a man of about 55 years and resides on Pleasant Street. He formerly was a resident of King's Road, and was known as a harmless, quiet man, and more or less weakly. Clarke had the reputation of being somewhat afflicted with mental trouble, and once before, so rumor has it, hurt a man with a knife, though not seriously. The affair is an unfortunate one in its every respect.

Railway Accident

WM. ANSTEE, BRAKESMAN, KILLED YESTERDAY.

Wm. Anstee, brakeman with the Reid Mfg. Company, and a native of Codroy, was killed at 7 a.m. yesterday over in that section. As far as we can learn from the Reid Mfg. Co., the deceased jumped from the rear part of the train as it was in motion, and falling the car went over him and he was crushed to death by the break beams of the car. Though the body was not mangled, death was instantaneous and the remains were later confined and sent to Channel, where his mother resides, for interment. Deceased was only 21 years old. An enquiry will be held.

Narrowly Escaped Death.

Glady's Pottles and her father, Mr. T. Pottles, of the Horwood Lumber Co., narrowly escaped being killed yesterday afternoon at their home, on Cornwall Avenue. The father was sat near his door when a sudden gust of wind dislodged the 20-foot ladder resting against the house. It was falling on the little girl who stood near when Mr. Pottles ran to save her. The ladder struck him, breaking in two and inflicting a painful injury to his head and shoulders. It also struck the little one falling her to earth and caused such injury that she was unconscious for three hours. A doctor was called, and under his care the little one revived and is better to-day. The escape of father and child from death was a narrow one.

Prima Donn's Triumph

Floral Tributes to Madame Melba Make a Veritable Garden.

Madame Melba, whose appearance at Covent Garden, recently, marked the twenty-fifth anniversary of her debut there, told an interviewer that she was "gloriously happy" after her triumph, and full of gratitude for the delight over the magnificent reception accorded her.
The prima donna has received 840 telegrams of congratulation from all parts of the world on the occasion of the twenty-fifth anniversary, cables having been received from Australia, Russia, Spain, Holland, Italy and America. The message, however, which she prizes most was one from King George, which reached her on the morning of her anniversary.
Madame Melba's apartments were a veritable flower garden. She was surrounded by a plethora of floral tributes showered upon her on the stage. Bouquets and baskets of flowers were lined the staircase. Some of the tributes were of so large dimensions as to require the services of three people to handle them. One such was a massive gift of the rarest orchids and choicest roses arranged to represent a lyre.

Duchess Taken to Task as Critic.

London, June 9.—The Duchess of Marlborough, formerly Consuelo Vanderbilt, who this week delivered a stirring lecture criticising modern mothers, in which she declared a "well cooked meal" was the strongest sort of "temperance argument, received a spirited challenge from a writer in the Daily Sketch.

Sir R. Baden-Powell's Similitude of Empire Unity.

A special Empire Day message by General Sir Robert Baden-Powell, K.C.B., appears in a recent issue of the "Scout," the official organ of the Boy Scouts. The Chief Scout writes as follows:

"I send my cordial greetings to my brother Scouts of all ages throughout our Empire.
"Two years ago I only knew of them, but last year I met them face to face, so now I feel that we are closer in touch, although the seas may lie between us.

"I often think that the different countries which form the British Empire, are like so many sticks. An enemy attacking one of them might break it, but if all are tied together in a faggot they would be unbreakable.

"The different Overseas Dominions are bound together by the tie of kinship, being all of British blood, and now a second bond has come—the brotherhood of Scouts—which will knit us all more closely yet, so that our Empire will remain unbreakable. If every stick keeps sound itself, 'So do your best, my lads, to make your country strong, and to keep in touch with your brother Scouts beyond the seas.'"

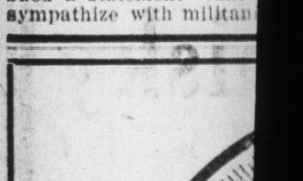
