Quite a number of cases of typhoid fever are reported from Carbonear, due it is thought, to bad water. The well has been closed up for the present and purer water is being supplied the people of that section of the place.

A couple of cases of scarlet fever developed in the extreme West End a few days ago. The house was at once placed on quarantine, and we hope the family are being properly looked after, while kept in, not for their own but the public good.

It is said that two or three dollars were found on the person of the poor old man Brien, who with his sister died under such sad conditions here early this week, and that some people are using the word, "I told you so," as a relief to their conscience. Coal is now selling at \$7.20 per ton, cartage 40c.; total \$7.60 per ton, too high for the well-to-do, and certainly above the means of the poor.

The two little boys, aged 11 and 12, who were before Judge Oke here charged with putting obstructions on the railway track, were on account of their tender years released by the parents paying costs and agreeing to punish the children and look out for their good behaviour in future.

Street Car Jumps Track.

The street car No. 7, jumped the track at the junction of Adelaide and New Gower Streets yesterday afternoon. When at the top of Theatre Hill, opposite Berrigan's, the motorman lost control of the brakes with the result that the car sped down the descent at a rapid rate. The emergency brake was applied, but this failed to work. In the meantime Conductor Lilly quickly informed the passengers of their position and asked them to keep their places. While he was speaking, the car, taking the curve at Adelaide Street, bounded over the rails and toppled over into the street with the exit side down, imprisoning all the occupants of the car except the motorman who was thrown from his post out on the street. A large number of people gathered round and rendered assistance. Of the thirteen passengers in the car at the time of the accident none were seriously injured. Mrs. E. J. Kieley, the only lady passenger at the time, received a severe shock and also sustained some slight injuries. Mr. S. Ryall was cut about the head and hands by the broken glass, and a few others received slight injuries, and had to be driven home. The car was placed on the tracks after about two hours' and was taken to the shed for extensive repairs which will take several days.

OTTAWA, Nov. 23.
As a result of the reciprocity agreement with the British West Indies and British Guiana, trade between Canada and those portions of the Empire is showing material increase of Canada's exports of dry salted fish, butter, cheese, canned meats and oats. Our cereal foods show increases, and trade in Canadian automobiles is being built up. Canada's imports of cocoa-beans from the British West Indies show an increase, also in lime juice, honey, sponges, sugar and bananas.

The Frailty of Man.

Hunting Alligators With a Lasso.

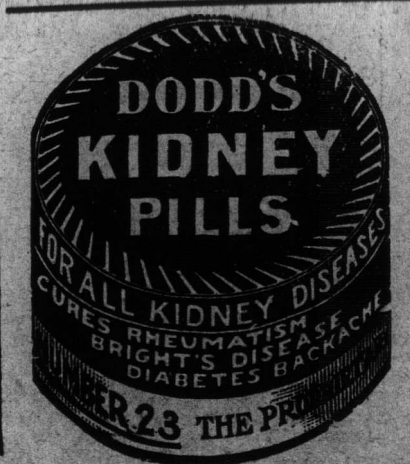
A Business Not Yet Overcome.
Shooting alligators is tame sport compared with the methods adopted by Mr. Lee and his two sons, who have an alligator business in Proserpine, North Queensland. If you fancy an alligator as a pet, all you have to do is to order one from Mr. Lee, who will deliver one of whatever age or size you wish. With lasso and dogs he captures them alive, but it is a perilous and exciting business. There is no dish an alligator likes so much as a nice dog, and knowing the reptile's weakness in this respect, Mr. Lee baits his trap with a yelping canine, one who, however, suffers no injury. On the sloping bank of a creek infested with alligators Mr. Lee constructs a trap, consisting of a barrier composed of sticks and brushwood, with a small hole like the entrance to a kennel. Behind the barrier he places a dog as bait, and the barking of the animal soon attracts the attention of one of the reptiles. As it scrambles towards the barrier the dog, which has been trained for the purpose, flies out and attacks the reptile, while Mr. Lee hurls a lasso over the alligator's head ere it has time to retreat.

Whipping the other end round a tree and securing it, Mr. Lee, armed with a forked stick attached to a rope with a running noose, tries to thrust it into the alligator's mouth. Every moment there is the danger of being seriously injured, if not killed, by a sweep of the powerful tail, or crushed in the reptile's jaws. Sometimes the struggle continues over an hour, but once the stick is thrust into the mouth of the exhausted alligator the rest is comparatively easy. The jaws and tail are rapidly trussed up with the rope, and the monster lies helpless.

To Mr. Lee belongs the credit of having caught alive in this fashion the largest alligator in Australia. The capture was made when executing an order for a live alligator for a firm in Melbourne. Though the tip of its tail was missing the reptile still showed a length of 17 feet 6 inches, and turned the scales of 38 cwt.

Mr. Lee's expertness in catching alligators recently led to a bet that he would not recapture one fifteen and a half feet long, which he had sold to the layer of the bet, in ten minutes. Mr. Lee accepted the challenge, the alligator was seen in a creek, and Mr. Lee, assisted by his sons, caught it within five minutes.
