## THE FISHERY RESOLUTIONS.

Last night the House of Assem-  
bly was taken up on a useful debate  
on the Fishery Resolutions introduced  
by the Prime Minister. The intro-  
ducer had already set forth his views  
and contented himself by expressing  
the hope that party feeling might be  
kept out of the discussion.

Mr. Hickman took up the discus-  
sion and spoke from the standpoint  
of one who had spent a lifetime in  
handling fish and whose business  
brought him into contact with the  
needs of the markets which Newfound-  
land fish enters. He strongly ad-  
vocated the culling of fish by a body  
which would be independent. He  
thought the cull should be independ-  
ent of the Board of Trade, and the  
Marine and Fisheries Department,  
and believed we had in the police  
force an independent body of men,  
fearless in the discharge of their duty,  
who as ex-servicemen could be easily  
trained for the work. The standardi-  
zation of fish for export was a more  
difficult matter. The standards in  
the foreign markets were already fixed  
and fish exporters must either  
comply with them or take the finan-  
cial consequences of not doing so.  
Mr. Hickman's contribution to the  
debate was most valuable. Mr. Kent  
spoke in a most encouraging way of  
the attempt to grapple with the situ-  
ation and considered the proposals be-  
fore the House the most important  
which could occupy the attention of  
the members. He thought the Marine  
and Fisheries Department was not  
living up to what should be required  
of it in a country whose staple in-  
dustry was fish. It should be a  
Bureau for the collection and dissem-  
ination of information connected with  
the fisheries. Mr. Downey and Mr.  
Moulton and Mr. Devereaux spoke  
with an extensive practical acquaint-  
ance with the problems before the  
House and contributed valuable sug-  
gestions to the debate.

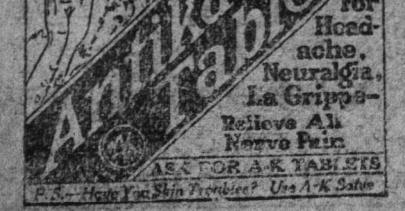
The resolutions passed and a com-  
mittee was appointed to sit with a  
committee of the Legislative Council  
yet to be appointed. The committee  
consists of the Prime Minister, the  
Minister of Marine and Fisheries, the  
Minister of Finance and Customs, Mr.  
Kent, Mr. Hickman and the Speaker.  
It is a matter of regret that one rep-  
resentative of more or less of the dis-  
senting opinion owing to the course  
of events in the House, to serve on  
the committee. It is also regrettable  
that the head of the Fisheries Depart-  
ment should have been held up in  
Burlin and away from the House when  
such important topics were under dis-  
cussion.
