their attempt. During the night there was no infantry action from the enemy. There is intermittent artillery activity in all Verdun sectors.

The right was calm on the whole front. In the Verdun region one of our planes fell on a German machine, which was seen falling in flames in our lines near Mongeville. Five of our aeroplanes, doubled-motored, bombarded the Metz railway station, Sablon and depots of munitions near Salins Castle, also on the Dieuze aerodrome. Thirty big calibre shells were thrown during that expedition, of which 29 were dropped on the Metz railway station. Our groups of aeroplanes, composed of 23, threw 72 projectiles on the aviation camp of Habsheim and on the storehouse of Malhausen. Enemy's machines sent after ours, engaged in aerial fights, during which a French and a German aviator fell on each other with machine-gun firing. Two other German machines fell in flames, several of ours were seriously hit, and had to land on the German side.

BRITISH HEADQUARTERS REPORT

British Headquarters report slight artillery activity on the western front. The Germans delivered several fierce attacks against the French at Vaux, but were beaten back. The Russians have occupied the village of Mamakhatun in their pursuit of the Turks towards Erzincan. Italian guns have ranted the enemy on the march, inflicted severe damage in the Upper Rienz, and started fires.

A British force in Egypt has completely routed the enemy within three weeks, and captured all his artillery. The Mexican war decree gives any citizen the right to kill, if necessary, the followers of Villa.

The Germans resumed the attack around Verdun, but were checked by the French curtain of fire.

Major Stanley Bauld, of Halifax, 15th Battalion, C.E.F., has been seriously wounded in action.

PRINCE OF WALES IN EGYPT.

LONDON, March 19. The Prince of Wales has arrived in Egypt to take up an appointment as staff captain with the general officer commanding in Chief the Mediterranean Expeditionary force, says an official statement issued to-night.

ASQUITH TO BE QUESTIONED.

LONDON, March 19. Asquith will be asked in the Commons on Thursday, whether the Government will participate in a conference of all the Powers to discuss peace terms, the Exchange Telegraph declared to-day.

KITCHENER ISSUES ARMY ORDER

LONDON, March 19. Field Marshal Kitchener, Secretary of State for War, issued an army order to-day, announcing that the King has authorized the formation of a corps entitled the Royal Defence Corps, with pay, the same as that of regular infantry. The order does not explain the object, but it is believed to be connected with an effort to solve the problem of recruiting small men.

THE CALL UP REMAINING GROUPS.

LONDON, March 19. The Central News says it understands that the War Office has decided to call up all the remaining groups of attested men without delay, and that it is probable that they will be notified for service with the colors before the end of March or early in April. The Government is reported to have virtually solved the question of providing for the liabilities of enrolled men, such as rent and insurance.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, March 19. (Official.) East of the Meuse, after violent bombardment, the enemy during yesterday evening launched a violent attack against our Vaux-Damloup front. Repulsed by our cross-fires, the Germans completely failed in

excellent service he had rendered the country during his long career as commander and organizer of the German navy. The Emperor, at the same time, has ordered that the name of Von Tirpitz should continue on the navy list, and has bestowed on him the star of Grand Commander of the Order of the House of Hohenzollern, with swords.

FRENCH TORPEDO BOAT SUNK.

PARIS, March 19. The French torpedo boat destroyer Renaudin has been sunk in the Adriatic by a submarine. Three officers and 24 of the crew were lost; two officers and 34 of the crew were saved.

CARDINAL DEAD.

ROME, March 19. Cardinal Jerome Margiotti, Prefect of the Propaganda, died to-day.

Volunteers Parade.

Headed by the C. C. C. Band the Volunteers, over 200 strong, turned out for church parade yesterday morning. The Church of England under Lieut. Rendell, attended Divine Service at St. Thomas's; the Roman Catholics, under Lieut. O'Grady, at the Cathedral, and the Methodists, under Lieut. Ayre, at Cochrane St. The turn out was the largest for some time, and attracted much attention. After service the companies assembled at the head of Cochrane Street and marched through the city, patriotic airs were discoursed along the line of march.

Dunure Brought Molasses Cargo

From Barbados Where She Put in a Disabled Condition For Repairs.

The barge, Dunure, Capt. Connolly, arrived Saturday night from Barbados, after an absence of six months from St. John's. The vessel went from here to Bahia with a fish cargo and after discharging there left for this port, but while on the run encountered a heavy weather and sustained considerable damage, the vessel being forced to put into Barbados in a disabled condition for repairs, which occupied several weeks. When the Dunure was fit to go to sea again she loaded molasses cargo for Barbados and made the run in 29 days, having favourable weather en route. Her molasses cargo is consigned to A. S. Rendell and Co.
