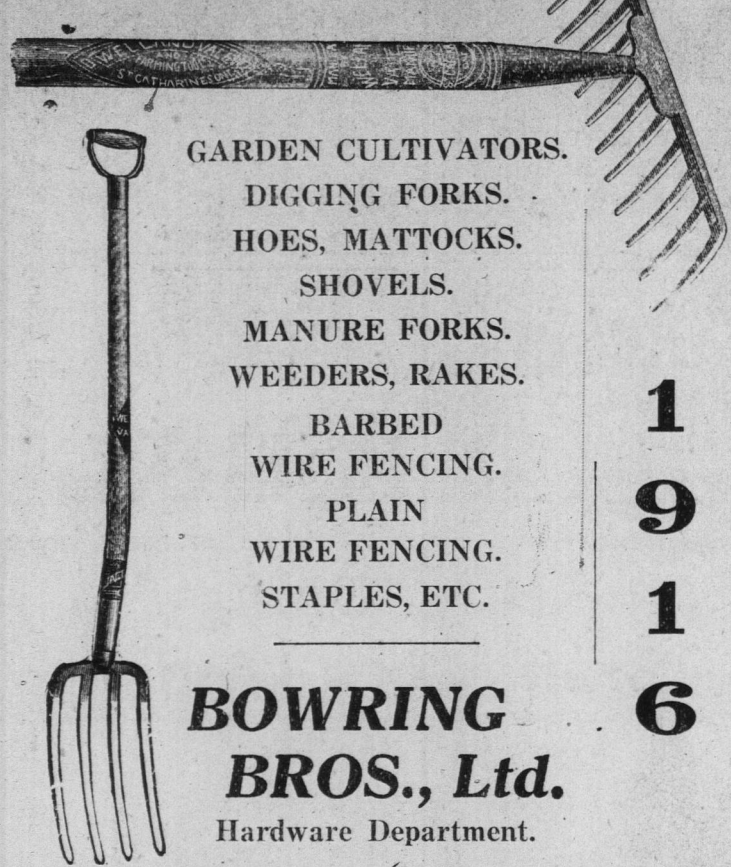

**NO INTENTION TO VIOLATE HOL-
LAND.**
THE HAGUE, To-day.
The French Minister to Holland,
Desjardins, has given Holland an
assurance that neither France nor her
Allies ever contemplated directly or
indirectly attacking the neutrality of
Holland or the inviolability of its ter-
ritory, says a communication issued
by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs
yesterday. The assurance adds that
the recent conference of the Allies in
Paris did not occupy itself with Hol-
land at all.

PURCHASING MULES.

KANSAS CITY, To-day.
The British Army officers resumed
the purchase of horses in Kansas City
market to-day after a lapse of six
months. It is announced six hundred
mules have been shipped from here to
Newport News to be loaded for Eu-
rope.

MORE SHIPS TORPEDOED WITH-
OUT WARNING.

LONDON, To-day.
The Germans are not using either
super-submarine or under-water boats
without periscopes in their new com-
paign, according to the best informed
naval authorities here. It was pointed
out to-day from naval sources that
German submarines are following their
usual course, that there is no evi-
dence that they are able to travel a
greater distance than previously was
the case, or to stay out longer. The
chief difference in the new cam-
paign, according to British naval offi-
cers, lies in the fact that more ships
are being torpedoed without warning.
This development was not unexpec-
ted by naval authorities who predicted
a greater loss in ships as the season
advanced. Admiralty officials evi-
dently are not greatly worried over
the destruction of tonnage, asserting
that additional mercantile tonnage
needed can be built by a system of
adjustment which will not interfere
with the British naval programme.

MORE WOUNDED EXPECTED.

LONDON, To-day.
Although casualties resulting from
last week's attacks on the craters at
St. Etienne, are not known, yet every
preparation is being made on this side
for the reception of a large number
of Canadian wounded, who are ex-
pected to arrive shortly at Pooleston
and other Canadian hospitals.

FRENCH FIGHTING.

LONDON, To-day.
A War Office communication issued
last night says: Last night we made
a small successful raid on the enemy
trenches near Richebourg. Avons.
Ten Germans were killed. The enemy
last night made three successive at-
tacks west of Pithou-Tyres road and
first gained a footing in our trenches
but were quickly turned out, and
other attacks repulsed, the Germans
leaving about 25 dead in front of our
trenches and three prisoners in our
hands. We bombarded the enemy
trenches in this area. There was con-
siderable artillery activity to-day
northwest of Wytauchets and some
shelling about Souchez, Carancy and
Colonne. Behind St. Etienne there has
been heavy hostile shelling but little
shelling on the front lines of the cra-
ters. It is now established that the
gallant fighting of the Canadians in
this neighborhood inflicted heavy losses
on the enemy during last week.

BUDGET OF WAR NEWS.

NEW YORK, To-day.
That a German submarine was not
responsible for damage to the French
cross-Channel ferry steamer Sussex,
but that the Germans did sink a steamer
in the region of the English Chan-
nel the afternoon the Sussex met
with disaster, are the statements con-
tained in Germany's reply to the An-
tler Government's request for infor-
mation concerning the Sussex. The
steamer sunk is supposed to be the war
vessel or mine layer recently
built of the Arabic class, says the
statement.
The Germans northwest of Verdun
are evidently holding in the least
their infantry for fresh attacks in
their endeavors to capture Hill 204
and Le Mort Homme key points
which are tenaciously barring the way
to the fortress. The infantry remain-
ing idle in their trenches while big
guns were showering shells on the
region, embracing a triangle formed
by Hill 204 around Esnes and Le
Mort Homme. Not even a sally by the
Germans in this district is reported
in the latest French official commu-
cation. Comparative quiet prevails
east of the Meuse and around Douai-
mont and Vaux, where there recently
had been some vicious fighting. Ar-
tillery has been less marked by both
sides than on previous days. Mining
operations and grenade fighting have
taken place in Argonne forest, during
which the French captured the southern
edges of two craters near Les
Courtes Chaussees. In the Russian
theatre there have been artillery du-
els and infantry attacks at various
places. On the Austro-Italian front
the Italians have taken the Russian
heights north of Rionapale, and
a strong line of trenches and re-
doubts on the southern slopes of
Monte Pari and Cinadore, and on the
rocks of Monte Sperone, the Austrians
suffering heavy casualties. Elsewhere
along the line activity continues. A
despatch from Salonika re-
ports a recrudescence of artillery
fighting on the Greek front between
Givigli and Delran. In Asiatic Tur-
key, Petrograd reports a continuation
of the Russian advance, west of Er-
zerum. The Turks, however, in the
region of Bitlis took the offensive
against invaders, but all their attacks
were repulsed. Although the Turks
have a serious defence near Faldin

MEXICO CITY, To-day.
The Mexican Government has sent
a note to its Ambassador in Washing-
ton, to be delivered this morning
to Secretary of State Lansing, asking
that American troops be withdrawn
from Mexican territory and that the
pursuit of Villa be left to the Mexican
Constitutionalist Army.

2,500,000 BRITISH TROOPS IN
FRANCE.

LONDON, To-day.
A Daily News despatch from Paris
states the French Des Armes says the
British army in France, which num-
bered but sixty thousand in August,
of 1914, now numbers 2,500,000.

IN HUMAN BULLETS.

LONDON, To-day.
The Crown Prince is using razor
bullets in Verdun, each bullet weighs
an eight of an ounce and has a trian-
gular steel blade as sharp as a razor,
which makes an ugly wound and one
difficult to heal.

GENERAL PETAIN'S LATEST
SUCCESS.

PARIS, To-day.
A German general attack on the
left bank of the Meuse which began on
Sunday is regarded as having been
beaten, and the Germans have re-
verted to the previous relatively small al-
ternate strokes against French posi-
tions on both sides of the River and
to artillery operations. When the re-
maining French projections along the
Forces Brook had been straightened
out the Germans were able to engage
the principal line to the west of the
River from Avoncourt by Hill number
204, and Dead Man's Hill to the west.
Only frontal attacks under difficult
conditions were possible except at
Deadman's Hill where the Germans
were able to attack through Ravinees.
They tried to force a passage between
Deadman's Hill and Cumerles and to
work around the south of the hill in
order to envelop it. After two days of
hard fighting this manoeuvre failed,
and with it is believed to have col-
lapsed the main idea of that particular
German attack. The small gain which
the Germans made northwest of the
Hill is not regarded as of the nature
to modify the situation. The military
observers point out that General Pe-
tain once more has succeeded with a
minimum of wastage in beating off

with heavy loss the adversaries' at-
tack thereby increasing the morale of
their army, and enhancing his own re-
putation.

SAILING VESSEL TORPEDOED.
BARCELONA, To-day.
The Russian sailing vessel Impera-
tor, was torpedoed by an Austrian
submarine in the Mediterranean.

LULL IN VERDUN BATTLE.

PARIS, To-day.
Another lull has fallen on the Ver-
dun battle field, as Germans have been
obliged to pause in order to fill up
their gaps in the ranks, to replace
damaged guns and bring up munitions
preparatory to further onslaughts. It
is believed that the French command
is not likely to modify its methods.
General Petain is said to be quite sat-
isfied as long as the Germans go on
to press a counter attack on a large
scale when opportunity comes, and
stocks of munitions which are practi-
cally inexhaustible.
