Ottawa, May 13-Scenes of great enthusiasm marked the announcement by Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, at the evening sitting of the House of Commons that Hon. Dr. Beland, M.P., who for almost four years has been a prisoner in Germany, has been released. and is now on his way home. 
