## Turkish Control Denounced.

Boston, Feb. 21.—A letter sent to Acting Secretary of State Polk, by 114 Episcopal clergymen of this state, urged: "That all true influence be used to end Turkish rule in Europe forever, and to secure the great church of the Holy Wisdom to its rightful Christian use."  
"We feel," the letter adds, "That it is both immoral and dangerous to allow the Sultan even nominal authority in Constantinople, or over Christian peoples everywhere and mindful of the millions of eastern Christians martyred by order of the Turkish power we appeal for justice against these murderers."
