Legislative Council.

—FRIDAY, May 5th.

The House met at 4 p.m. and the
Bill entitled "An Act to amend Chap-
ter 33 of the Consolidated Statutes
(Third Series) entitled 'The Judicial
Act' and 'An Act to repeal the
Aerial Mail Service Act, 1918' were
given a final reading. The House ad-
journed at 4.30 until Tuesday next at
4 p.m.

Mass Meeting in
Bannerman Park.

UNEMPLOYED DEMAND IMMEDIATE
WORK—PRIME MINISTER
PROMISES CONSIDERATION.

The unemployed of St. John's to the
number of six or seven hundred as-
sembled in Bannerman Park yester-
day afternoon for the purpose of
hearing the result of an interview
which a deputation of their number
had with the Prime Minister during
the forenoon. Chairman Power from
the Band Stand announced to the
gathering that "as a result of their
conference, the Prime Minister would
immediately give his attention to the
labor problem and that, within the
course of a few days, work would be
provided. He had informed the dele-
gation that relief work would not have
continued in the ordinary course of
events much longer than the first or
second week of May. The amount
per man expended during the winter
was about \$120, and amongst those
who received relief were a number of
farmers and quite a percentage of
fishermen. The time had now come
when the farmers should get back to
their land and the fishermen to their
avocation. The government had ar-
ranged for the distribution of seed and
seed potatoes to help the farmers.
Although it was decided to close down
relief works the government, so the
Prime Minister had informed him, had
taken this step sooner than was in-
tended through the force of public
opinion and the action of the Board of
Trade. He also informed the dele-
gation that when the farmers, fisher-
men and others who could possibly
find work were weeded out, employ-
ment for the others would be found.

URGENT PEACEABLE METHODS.
Following the Chairman Mr. Cahill
spoke somewhat along the same lines
and urged his hearers not to violate
the law until they were driven to it.
He did not blame the government for
the closing down of the work, but by
what the Prime Minister had said it
was due to the action of the Board of
Trade. If what they had been told
was true it was time to make the mer-
cantile people open up work.

Mr. J. Seaton urged his auditors not
to violate the law in any action they
would take, and thereby have them
called hooligans. He asked that the
gathering would make suggestions as
to the line of action that the Commit-
tee should adopt.

Seaman Grey one of the unemployed
suggested that the Board of Trade
should be seen at once. He did not
see why they should wait until all the
fishermen and others were weeded out
before getting work. Many were al-
ready down and out and most could
not wait another two or three weeks.
"Mr. Seaton," the Prime Minister
said he would take the matter up
within a week. The whole subject
has been gone over thoroughly by
your committee. We were told by the
Prime Minister that during a walk up
the Southside he had seen some 18
fishing boats on the bank. It was
time he said for these to be busy, but
while relief work was going on the
fishermen would not get busy."

Mr. Bennett said that according to
the Prime Minister if they needed
work they would have to line up. He
gave the committee a promise that as
far as he was concerned, work would
be found in a day or two as the money
was there. The work had been closed
down by the government in order to
weed out independent men, who were
taking advantage of the relief work.

NOT WORKABLE PROPOSITION.
A proposition to empower the com-
mittee to ascertain the attitude of the
Board of Trade in reference to gov-
ernment relief work for those in need
was not carried owing to the delay
the negotiations would cause. It was
subsequently resolved that the com-
mittee should again interview the
Prime Minister and tell him that
work was needed immediately. Be-
fore the close of the meeting Caleb
Robins endeavored to introduce po-
litics but he was ruled out as it ap-
peared to many that he had been sent
to the meeting on purpose. He ad-
vised the meeting to first deal with
the Opposition and put a muzzle on
them. The greatest obstacle they had
was the House of Assembly. It was
filled with men who said they were
honorable but he called them scound-
rels. Work should be provided sup-
posing they had to auction the House
of Assembly. Before closing his har-
angue, Mr. Robins informed the
gathering that the Telegram was re-
sponsible for a lot of the bad feeling
at present existing. Needless to say
his remarks were laughed at.

A vote of thanks was passed by the
meeting to Mayor Cook and Councillors
for the use of the park to hold the
meeting in. A large number of
those present were tradesmen and
clerks, who no doubt must be forced
by the most pressing need to subject
themselves to the humiliation of hav-
ing to seek for relief, and the matter
should be given immediate attention.






