

Bon's Defeat**Terra Novas.**

THE TERRA NOVAS went down to defeat for a third time this season at the hands of the St. Bon's Six, by a score of 5 goals to 2 in the poorest exhibition of hockey seen this season. The exhibition was given by the Governor and the Hon. the Minister of the Interior, who were present.

The lights being off all night, it was not until 3.12 that the game started. The players to be seen were:

1ST PERIOD.
The St. Bon's pressed the Terra Novas and had a try for goal, but failed to score. The puck was cleared from the danger zone and play was made of the center. Eddie Phelan then took control of the disc and combined with Muir, who beat Brown, after 10 minutes of play. The honors were evenly divided when Canning was away on his own just before the end of the period and scored the first goal. St. Bon's goal; Terra Novas goal.

2ND PERIOD.
The St. Bon's pressed matters from the start but their forward's shooting was very erratic. Muir and Fox went to the ice, the latter missing the net by inches. Callahan, by an individual effort failed a little later, while Keegan missed a beautiful shot to score in the mouth of the net. Clarke, Canning and Field work hard for the Terra Novas but found Ray, Halley in goal unbeatible. Eddie Phelan and G. Halley the St. Bon's defence men were getting in some work by clever stick-handling at the net and after eighteen minutes play Phelan was rewarded for efforts when he placed the disc behind Brown, recording No. 2 goal. The period ended with St. Bon's leading by a score of 3 to 1.

3RD PERIOD.
The resumption of play the orange black team, with Canning and Halley in the attack, kept up a very hot pace, and shot upon shot was kept upon Halley. In the meantime, the Muir, who was turning in the game for the night, captured the net and saved the situation. In the end he cleverly stick-handled his way through the Terra Nova team, just a good chance to score when the goal area. St. Bon's increased their score to three after eight minutes of play, when Dr. Fox scored by another forty seconds later. The Terra Novas and Canning took control after some clever stick-handling Halley, scoring No. 2 for the St. Bon's. Just before the close of the period Halley increased the St. Bon's score to 5 goals, when he beat Keegan's defence, and by a well timed shot beat Brown for the last goal of the evening. Game over. TWILLINGATE GIVES DELEGATES ENTHUSIASTIC RECEPTION.

Twillingate, Jan. 29.—One of the most enthusiastic meetings ever held in Twillingate was conducted by Messrs. Carter and Winsor, delegates of United Fishermen's movement on Saturday night last. Victoria Hall was crowded, all available standing room was taken up, and large numbers could not obtain admittance. The meeting opened sharp at eight o'clock. The audience elected Mr. S. Love-ridge as Chairman. Messrs. Carter and Winsor, although having had a hard day's travel over ice and snow, were in good fighting trim and delivered strong and convincing addresses bearing on the present intolerable burden of taxation and the importance of the assembly being immediately opened, and the problem to be solved whereby the fishery of 1923 will be prosecuted, with hope of remunerative returns. Continuous applause greeted the speakers. Not one word of interruption was given. Captain Alfred Kearney, planter-fisherman of Herring Neck, who accompanied the delegates, also gave a sound and convincing address declaring he would not be able to prosecute the fishery this year unless taxation was reduced, enabling him to obtain cheaper outfit. Several fishermen in the audience endorsed the addresses given. Mr. Carter presented resolutions dealing with reduced expenditure and taxation and the whole audience rose to their feet as one man fully endorsing same. A committee of fifteen was appointed and will solicit signatures to resolutions. An unanimous vote of thanks was accorded the speakers for their interest in coming to us especially at this time of year in the interest of the people's movement. Twillingate stands solidly behind this movement. At a late hour the meeting closed with the National Anthem and rousing cheers for the United Fishermen's Movement. Truly it was a wonderful meeting and a big contrast to a public meeting held here earlier in the week by Mr. F. Boone when less than one hundred attended. S. Furness Withy Co.**HAVE FOUR SHIPS BUILDING.**

Four steamers, each about 7,900 tons gross, are at present under construction by the Furness Shipbuilding Company of Haverton Hill, on Tees, for Messrs. Furness Withy & Co. The first of these steamers, the London Importer, was launched during November last, and is now being fitted for service. The second, the London Commerce, is now ready for launching to be followed later by the London Merchant and London Shipper. These vessels will be equipped with geared turbines developing about 5,400 shaft horse power.

8 Years in The Post.**DELATED ARRIVAL OF LETTERS FROM NEWFOUNDLAND.**

Posted in Newfoundland on November 20 and 21, 1914, two letters and a packet of papers were delivered together yesterday at their destination in London. The post-mark showed that they reached Liverpool on Monday.
The letters contained urgent business reports from a Newfoundland company to one of its officials in London.
They were probably held up through an oversight in Canada or the United States, a Post Office official told a Daily Mail reporter yesterday. It is strange that they have apparently kept together all the time.
The normal time for mails from Newfoundland is 12 days.—Daily Mail, Jan. 4.

Tennis Balls Carried on Racket by Spring.

Tennis players will appreciate an appliance introduced for the purpose of carrying that extra set of balls to and from the courts during the summer months when pocket space is usually limited.
