RUINING A COUNTRY.

When grim, stark tragedy stalks throughout a once prosperous land, there must be some primary cause to which this is attributable, and those who are following closely to-day the record and actions of the present Government since their accession to power in November, 1919, must see plainly that for all the disaster and depression which followed the assumption of the Squires-Coaker administration, they and they alone are responsible.
