WINNIPEG, May 30.—Urging ada an Anglo-Saxon country, Walter McRaye, Canadian author, who is in Manitoha in search of data for a book of history on the province, denounced the wholesale dumping of what he described as "little Asias" into the west in addressing the Kiwanis club here In advocating Canadian national ization, Mr. McRaye stipulated that he did not want it confused with the nationalization proclaimed by Que-bec, but rather founded upon principles brought to Canada by United Empire Loyalists, that we should always remain British and should in all

things govern ourselves. "We have come to a time Canada with their eyes fixed on some other country, and I say that Canada should harbor no man who cannot and will not become a Canadian,"

Mr. McRaye declared.

The question he said was how we are going to Canadianize the foreigners if we are not Canadianized ourselves. Even the government refused to recognize "Canadian" as a nationality. He did not expect a man to forhis mother country, but he chought it was illogical and unrea-conable of a Canadian born to be randed as an alien or hyphenate.

"I yield to none in my loyalty to the empire, but the pride that takes first place in my heart is the pride of being a Canadian," Mr. McRaye con-cluded.
